

# The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, March 24.—With buyers and sellers considerably apart in their views of values, potatoes are not moving as briskly as a week ago. Dealers today reported the San Francisco market a trifle weaker, and they seem little disposed to meet the growers' idea regarding prices. Quotations to the producers range from \$1.40 to \$1.50 a hundred, and some dealers maintain that these figures are out of line with conditions in the South.

The Southern onion market also was reported slightly easier today, but at \$1.75 to the growers the movement of Oregon onions to the California market continues at about the same rate as last week.

**All Poultry Lines Active.**  
The demand for poultry continues strong, and dealers look for an active market to the end of the week. No changes in prices were made today.

Country dressed meats still move in a satisfactory manner at the prices that have prevailed for a week or more.

At the lower prices that went into effect yesterday the butter market showed activity. Some of the city makers reported the cream supply still short of actual needs.

There is hardly enough cheese available now to make a market, and the outlook is for continued scarcity for a month or more. Prices today were unchanged.

**Eggs Are Slightly Weaker.**  
Eggs dealers today reported the demand in the North a little less strong than last week and trade consequently a trifle less active. Thus far this week, however, receipts have cleaned up fairly well. Today 20 to 25 cents was quoted, and the bulk of the business was around the former figure. The statement was made that some Oregon eggs have already been stored. As a rule storage operators never attempt to put any eggs away until they get down to about 17 or 18 cents.
