

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, March 26.—Fruit dealers today reported oranges very firm on the strength of the supply situation in the South where rains recently have interfered somewhat with the movement of the fruit. A range of \$2.25 to \$2.75 was quoted today.

Lemons are firm on account of news from the National capital regarding prospective changes in the duty on imported fruit. It is reported that the Payne tariff provides for an increase in the duty on lemons from the present rate of 1 cent to 1 1/4 cents a pound. But the Payne bill is not yet a law.

The apple trade continues steady to slow, with no material change in prices, but with receipts from the country steadily falling off stocks on the street are being reduced and the outlook is for a clean-up long before new crop is available.

Eggs Slightly Less Active.

A slight dragging tendency was evident in the egg trade today, heavy receipts from the country and an apparent weakening in the demand North being the factors, but prices held fairly steady around 20 cents, with 21 cents quoted in some quarters. A portion of the surplus daily is going into storage, and on the strength of these operations some dealers express the belief that egg prices this Spring will not go much if at all below the 20-cent mark.

The supply of poultry has been rather short all the week, and prices as a result have been maintained.

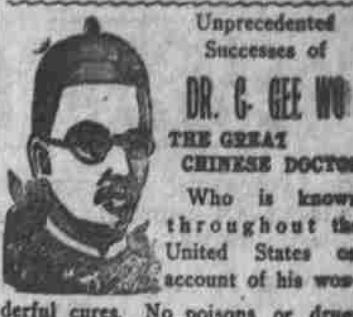
