

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, April 10.—That next week will open with lower prices ruling in the butter market was quite generally the belief in the local city creamery trade today. The situation in the south is steadily weakening and heavy shipments from California to the Portland and Seattle markets continue.

Butter sold at 25 and 26 cents today.

Eggs receipts were quite heavy today at the same prices as yesterday. All vegetables excepting cauliflower were plentiful today. Sweet potatoes were somewhat slow at \$2.25 to \$2.50 a hundred.
