

## The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, April 12.—The general decline in butter prices predicted by several of the city creamery men or the first of the week did not materialize today, and in some quarters this morning it was intimated that it might not come until the latter part of the week. That the market nevertheless was weak and a bit unsettled was evident enough. Of certain brands of city make there is no surplus for the time, and on these prices are well maintained. Others, however, are quoted lower, some at 27c, and the market is said to be pretty well loaded up with country and California butter, which is moving at 25c to 27c generally.

There was but little left today of the shipment of 300 cases of Tillamook cheese that came in last week, and further arrivals from that quarter are not expected until the latter part of this week. The market was very firm at the last quotations.

**Potatoes Likely To Advance.**  
That potato prices will be given a vigorous boost in the near future is more or less generally the belief of Oregon growers, and of some of the speculators as well. There is little doubt now that supplies in the South are very nearly out of the way, and the growers are confident that a strong demand there for Oregon will develop shortly.

The Oregon onion season is all but at an end. Only a few cars of good stock are left in the state and the holders of these show no anxiety to sell at current prices. Imperial Valley onions are expected here before the end of the week and it is expected that they will sell a little lower than at the opening a year ago.

**Prospect Good For Eggs.**  
Though some dealers on the street this morning expressed uncertainty as to the outlook for the egg trade for the week, it seemed to be the general belief that last week's prices would hold through the week at least. The chances are that the Sound markets will continue to buy, for storage and the Alaskan trade, and as long as there is an outlet there for the surplus here the markets will continue to buy, for storage and day, trade was quiet.

In poultry there was little doing, with no changes from the last quotations reported, and the situation was about the same in country dressed meats.
