OCEAN, BAR, BAY, DOCK AND RIVER

Equipment of Motor Boats—Department Circular No. 188, March 25, 1909. Whistle, Fog Horn, and Bell.—All motor vessels, without regard to size or use, must be provided with an efficient whistle, an efficient fog horn, and an efficient bell. No size or style of whistle, fog horn or bell is prescribed, provided it is available and sufficient for the use for which it is intended. The word "efficient" must be taken in its ordinary sense, considered with reference to the object intended by the provisions in which the word appears, namely, the production of certain signals. The power to operate the whistle is not prescribed, but it must be of such a character as to produce a prolonged blast, which is defined as from four to six seconds' duration.

Lights—When navigated between sunrise, they must carry regulation lights, namely:

1. A bright white light at the bow or head of the vessel.

2. A green light on the starboard side and a red light on the port side provided with proper screens. The side lights may be so affixed to the coaming or to the sides of the deck house as to be properly screened, provided the lantern be backed with metal. Whenever the green and red side lights cannot be fixed, they must be kept lighted and ready for use as provided by article six of the act of June 7, 1897.

The law does not appear to permit the use of a three-color "combination" light.

3. A white light aft, showing all around the horizon, to range with the head light.

Copies of Rules—Such vessels are also required to have on board two printed copies of the rules which must be observed by them, which rules will be furnished by local inspectors of steam vessels on request.

The Department requires that the name be conspicuously displayed on undocumented motor boats, that is, motor boats measuring less than five net tons.

The good ship Berlin, with her 177 people, bound for the Nushagak fisheries, in the interest of the Portland-Alaska Packing Company, went to the lower harbor on Sunday afternoon amid the farewell shouts of lots of her friends on the Astoria waterfront, and passed to sea on the lines of the Wallula, and laid her course for the far north. She will be followed this week from this port by the ships Henry Villard and the St. Nicholas, on the same high quest.

The ship Henry Villard will leave her berth this afternoon, and will sail for Nushagak in the course of a few days.

The customs launch Patrol took out a pleasant party of Astorians yesterday afternoon, headed by Hon. W. F. McGregor, collector of port, who was host of the hour to Paul Wessinger, of Portland, and the citizens who were serving on the reception committee from the Chamber of Commerce, and all indulged in a pleasant sail over the Columbian waters here. The trip was enjoyed by all who had the good fortune to be aboard.

The steamer Northland arrived in this port on Sunday last, from San Francisco, and landed 36 passengers, after which she went to sea at once, bound for Aberdeen, where she will take in tow a dredger, for San Pedro, and on her decks will take a load of pontoons and heavy timbers, destined for a dry-dock to be erected at that port.

The Government has instituted a new set of regulations for all motor power boats, concerning lights and fog horns, that will be of especial interest to owners of such craft hereabout. It is published in these columns and will be good reading for all owners.

The steamer F. S. Loop arrived in on Sunday last from the Golden Gate after another load of lumber, which will be put on board at Portland.

The steamship Breakwater made her due and regular appearance in these waters on Sunday last, and after a short stay at the O. R. & N. pers, went on to the metropolis.

The steamer Alliance was on the dot Sunday, on her trip to the Coos country, and left out with plenty of business on all decks.

The steamship Riverside crossed in from San Francisco on Sunday last and proceeded direct to Portland, after another cargo for the American-Hawaiian line.

The Standard steamship Atlas was among the getaways from this port on Sunday last, leaving out for the coast of California.

The dandy Columbine went to sea at 7 o'clock yesterday morning, on one of her frequent voyages of relief, and supply to the coast stations she serves. She will be gone for several days.

Norman Hackett, the popular young American actor, in "Classmates," the great American play, will be at the Astoria Theatre on April 24th. The production is one of the most sumptuous on the road.

UPPERTOWN YOUTHS IN SHOOTING SCRAPE

BOTH LIKED THE SAME GIRL AND A REVOLVER IS USED.

As the result of a quarrel over a young girl, Otto Sivo shot at Abel Hiltune at an early hour Sunday morning and winged him in the left leg, the bullet penetrating the thigh. The wound is not of a serious nature, it is presumed, though Hiltune is confined to his home in Uppertown with it. Sivo was arrested yesterday and held on \$400 bail.

The two young fellows both liked the same girl. After a dance in Uniontown Saturday night, Sivo was the lucky fellow and he went home with her, and as he left her at her home in Uppertown he breathed a tender good night and started away. He walked along until he came to Nyberg's cigar store, and there he found Hiltune. It was the case of the spark and the flint. They soon struck fire and there was scuffling, blows and hot words. A novelist would have described it as a duel.

But it seems that Sivo ran, or started to run—that is, he beat an orderly retreat. Hiltune followed a short distance. Both stopped. "We were about 25 feet apart," says Sivo. "I turned and looked at him. He was standing still, I think. I took out my revolver, unbuckled the buckle, unwrapped it from its covering, and then I took aim and"—bang.

That's about all Sivo recalls. He hit his adversary the very first time. It was a big 38 calibre ball, too, and might have meant death had it gone a foot or two higher.

Such is Sivo's story. Hiltune's has not been secured yet. It is understood that he is not anxious to prosecute the case. Whether the girl loves shooter or shootee must not be known, or if she loves either.

BIG FELLOWS STILL TALK

Burly Johnson Denies That He's Dodging A Fight.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Something of real sporting interest which will be gratefully received after a great deal of talk may develop in the prize fight situation here today, so far as it relates to the heavyweight championship. Jack Johnson, the negro victor over Tommy Burns, said last night that he had enough of the statements that he was trying to dodge a fight, and announced that he will appear in a certain sporting rendezvous today to arrange preliminary details for a fight with either Jeffries, Kaufman, Ketchel, Langford, Ferguson, or any other heavyweight. There has been so much talk, however, that followers of the sport take the announcement with the proverbial grain of salt and await developments skeptically.

Jeffries, Kaufman, Ketchel, and Langford all are in New York and it is said Ferguson will have a representative from Boston at today's meeting. This looks like action, and if Jeffries continues silent, the big negro must decide between Kaufman and Ketchel, that is if he makes good his statement of last night. But it is predicted that he may take the stand of waiting to fight the winner of a Kaufman-Ketchel bout.

James Coffroth, the San Francisco fight promoter, will be on hand to try and will endeavor to put through some sort of an agreement. He stands ready to give \$30,000 he says, for a 45 round go between Johnson and Ketchel, at Colma, Cal.

SERVICES NOT HELD

Christian Scientists Explain About Meetings In Hotel Plaza.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Although some 500 Christian scientists gathered in the grand ballroom of the Hotel Plaza yesterday afternoon, no service was held and the meeting was adjourned until next Sunday. It had been announced that the ballroom had been leased for a year for Sunday meetings, but Mrs. Della M. Gilbert, the moving spirit behind the project, declared that she deemed it best to postpone the service for a week in view of the fact that what she styled erroneous statements had been circulated concerning the plan. She was particularly emphatic in saying that the Christian Scientists were not making a bid to attract persons socially prominent.

"That is not the aim of Christian Scientists at all," said she. "Neither must we have the consent of Mrs. Eddy before we can go ahead with the present arrangements." The report that such was the case created a decidedly wrong impression.

A BUSY POLICEMAN

CHICAGO, April 12.—Two hundred and fifty eight arrests in one year during which fines amounting to \$619 were imposed is the record made by Patrol Sergeant James McCann.

Four of those whom he took into custody were charged with murder, two burglary, five with assault with deadly weapons and the remainder with violations of city ordinances. Property recovered by McCann amounted to \$638.

HOW THE BULL-RUN WATER PIPE BURST

ONE CONCEPTION OFFERED BY INTERESTED CITIZEN FOR UP RIVER ACCIDENT

"Astoria, April 12, 1909.

"Editor Astorian:

"It is said that the settlement of the land at Fort Stevens and along the west side of Young's Bay, recently reported in the Oregonian, has reached to Portland, and caused the breaking of the Bull Run water pipes, which furnish the west side of the Willamette. It has long been claimed, by those familiar with the locality, that trouble would be found in maintaining pipes across the river at that point, owing to the nature of the bottom. It is hinted that the settlement at Fort Stevens has had a tendency to drag the bottoms of the Columbia and Willamette rivers with it, thus pulling the Bull Run pipes apart, where they cross the Willamette. It is now up to the government engineers to do something to prevent further destruction of valuable property.

"We would suggest that excavations be made under the fort, and that strong timbering be placed to prevent further settlement. It might be well to drive piling in the vicinity of Warrenton, and through the piling drive heavy drift bolts, allowing the ends to project, thereby holding up the surface of the land.

"The above ideas are not original with me; but were suggested by reading the Oregonian, and a conversation I had with one who associates with civil engineers.

THE CLAIM LAWS

Bill Suggested To Make The Conditions Lighter.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Delegate Andrews of New Mexico in a bill introduced in the House, seeks to have the provision of the revised statutes, which provides that not less than \$100 be expended each year in patents which were issued on mining claims located after May 10, 1872, suspended for the year 1909.

The purpose of the bill is to prevent claims which have been regularly located and recorded under the local laws and mining regulations from being subject to forfeiture for non-performance of annual assessment work for the year 1909.

In order that claimants may enjoy the provisions of the proposed act they must record before December 31, 1909, in the office where the location notice is filed, notice that they intend to hold and work the claim in good faith.

AMATEURS TRY FLYING

Columbia University Students Making An Aeroplane.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Jay Gould son of Geo. Gould, and several other students of Columbia University are constructing an aeroplane which will be ready for trial during the next two weeks. It is being built in the Gould boat house on the Hudson river and will be tried first over the water. In fact, the students have departed from the track method of launching used by the Wright Brothers, and others, and will start their craft from the surface of the Hudson. Two boat-like arrangements pointed at both ends like a canoe and made air tight will be attached to the machine. It will be forty feet long and 26 feet wide.

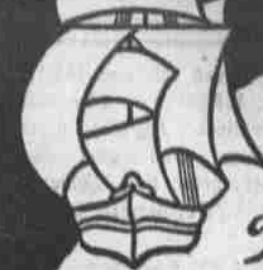
Episcopal Minister Remains A Catholic Only Short Time.

CHICAGO, April 12.—The Tribune in a news article today says that Dr. F. E. J. Lloyd who created a nationwide sensation two years ago, by renouncing the Episcopal faith and joining the Roman Catholic Church, has been received back into the Episcopal Church, having first made a recantation to Bishop Anderson.

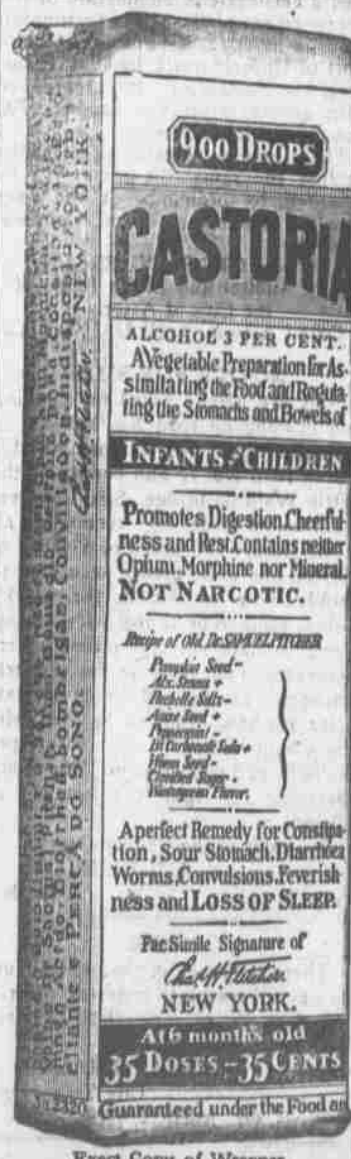
