**OCEAN BAR,
BAY, DOCK
AND RIVER**

The steamer Johan Poulsen, partly loaded with lumber, arrived down the river very early yesterday morning, and went direct to Knappton to finish loading at the Columbia Mills for San Francisco.

The steamer North Star, under command of Captain Hanson, with 19 people on board, will leave out tomorrow for Nushagak, Alaska, on her annual stunt of cannery-tending for the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company of this city. Superintendent P. A. Berglund goes out with her, as usual, as the company's agent and general representative there. All Astoria wishes them a successful season and a safe return home.

The steamer Alliance, with freight and passengers, is billed to depart for Coos waters at an early hour this morning, from the Callender dock.

The steamship Geo. W. Elder is due to arrive in this city from the California coast tomorrow evening or Tuesday morning.

The steamer Shoshone arrived down the river yesterday afternoon, and will sail for the Bay City at once.

The steamships Atlas and Buckman, both bound for Seattle, from the California coast, passed the mouth of the Columbia river yesterday morning.

The steamer Nome City arrived down at midnight with a cargo consisting of 850 tons of wheat, 500,000 ties and left out for San Francisco at 3 o'clock this morning.

When the sea tug Geo. R. Vosburg goes to sea and the Nehalem today, or tomorrow, she will carry from here one of the heaviest logging engines in the country. It was built at Tacoma for the Wheeler Lumber Co. of the Nehalem, and will be used in bringing out the timbers from the huge tracts owned by that company there.

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PEACE CONGRESS.

CHICAGO, April 24.—Announcement has been made regarding the diplomats who have signified their intention of coming to Chicago to attend the National Peace Congress to be held from May 3 to 5. Among those who will be present are Ambassador Count Johann Heinrich von Bernstorff of Germany; Herman D. Langerantz, envoy from Sweden; Dr. Wu Ting Fang, envoy from China; Alfred Mitchell Innes, Counselor of the British embassy and Dr. Halvdan Kont, professor of modern history in the University of Norway, Christiania, ex-president of the National Peace Organization of Norway.

Besides those named, representatives of the Japanese embassy, the Turkish legation and the French embassy will bring greetings to the congress from their governments.

Richard Bartholdt, Representative in Congress, from Missouri, will preside over the session at which the foreign representatives will speak.

SOLDIER BY INSTINCT.
CHICAGO, April 24.—James L. Dickson, 24 years old, who has a fortune of 125,000 has enlisted for four years in the United States Marine Corps. Four years ago when Dickson was about to enlist in the marine corps he received word that he had inherited \$100,000 from a rich uncle in California. He served out his time just the same and a month ago purchased his discharge and went to Toronto, where he added \$25,000 to his fortune by a deal in grain elevators. He soon tired of civilian life, and decided to re-enlist.
