PORTLAND, April 24.—The week has witnessed a slight but general improvement in the condition of the hide market, the result in the main of a better state of affairs in the leather trade of the country and more general activity on the part of manufacturers. The fact that the grub season is practically at an end is also a favorable factor in the local trade. As yet dealers report no improvement in prices over the past few weeks, but the outlook for the immediate future.

PROCEURESS IS JAILED.

NEW YORK, April 24.—Emma Chee, white wife of a Chinese, must serve not less than seven, nor more than ten years in prison at Auburn for luring young girls to New York's Chinatown. She was sentenced yesterday by Judge O'Sullivan in General sessions after having been convicted with Ong Sing, a waiter, of abducting a 16-year-old girl from her home in Brooklyn. Ong Sing married the child but she was later taken home by her parents. Her erstwhile Chinese husband must serve not less than two years and six months nor more than five years in Sing Sing.
