**JOHNSON'S PROGRAM**

CHICAGO, April 30.—A special dispatch to the Record-Herald today from Washington says that Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota, according to friends here, intends to enter the Senatorial race to contest for the seat now occupied by Senator Clapp. The term of Mr. Clapp expires March 4, 1911, and his successor will be elected by the Legislature sitting in 1910. Governor Johnson's great popular strength which has been sufficient to keep him in the gubernatorial chair in the face of Republican success elsewhere in the state, is suggested by his friends as warrant for the hope that Swedish members of the Minnesota Legislature elected as Republicans may be willing to join the Democrats in the Legislature in electing Governor Johnson to the Senate and thus launch him prominently as the Democratic Presidential candidate four years hence.

**ED. ROSENBERG'S VIEWS OF THE SITUATION**

**ADHERES TO HIS CONDEMNATION OF COMMERCIAL FISHING ABOVE TIDE.**

In response to an inquiry put to him yesterday by a representative of this paper, as to his views of the present salmon situation on the Columbia, Willamette and Clackamas, Secretary Ed. Rosenberg, of the Pacific Fishermen's Union, had the following to say:

"During my travels North and through California I read with especial interest clippings of the Morning Astorian dealing with the salmon situation on the Columbia.

"But somehow I cannot get up very much enthusiasm to denounce the fishermen of the Clackamas and the Willamette for fishing when there was an intended omission in the law passed at Salem excluding the Clackamas and the Willamette from the operation of the closed season. Of course it is wrong to fish in any salmon stream above head of tide, but everyone familiar with up-river conditions know that in the 40 miles of fishwheel territory the salmon are now being detained by the leads of the wheels and the upper parts of the mouths if the wheels located in the narrows and at the falls are closed by gates. For every fish caught by fishermen in the Clackamas and the Willamette, 10 salmon are 'stored' against the fishwheel leads to be caught by the wheels and seines in the first week in May.

"There never can nor will be true salmon protection on the Columbia unless all commercial salmon fishing is stopped at head of tide."

**BIG LIQUOR DEBATE.**

CHICAGO, April 30.—The debate on the liquor question tonight between Mayor Ross of Milwaukee and Professor Dickie of Albion College, Michigan, will be attended by delegations from the homes of the speakers and in the boxes will appear officials of the W. C. T. U., the Law and Order League and the Prohibition Party and representatives of the leading liquor dealers and manufacturers. The discussion, it is said, may be the last in which the two will engage, although an invitation has been extended by the Commissioners of the Yukon-Alaska-Pacific Exposition to be held in Seattle to hold a third debate there in connection with the Fair in July.

**TAFT ATTENDS CELEBRATION.**

ALEXANDRIA, Va., April 30.—With President Taft and many other persons of note in attendance and with an interesting programme of exercises, the celebration here today of the 120th anniversary of the first inauguration of George Washington as President of the United States proved a red-letter day in the history of Alexandria.

During the early forenoon hundreds of visitors poured into the city by boat and train. The Presidential party from Washington and Governor Swanson, his staff and other State officials from Richmond were among the arrivals. A number of Senators and Representatives in Congress also were included among the visitors.

The city was elaborately decorated in honor of the occasion. King street Washington street and other leading thoroughfares were dressed from end to end in the national colors. Especially elaborate were the decorations along the route of the parade, which was one of the features of the celebration. The procession comprised detachments of the regular army and State militia, the famous Richmond Blues and representatives of numerous patriotic societies. Occupying seats on the reviewing stand were the President and several members of his cabinet, Governor Swanson and staff, Lieutenant Governor Elyson Senator John W. Daniel, Congressman Charles C. Carlin and a number of other leading men of the State and Nation.

The celebration culminated in the dedication of the George Washington Park, a spacious and beautiful tract of land west of the city which has been set aside as a permanent memorial to the first President. The ceremonies incident to the dedication which included addresses by Governor Swanson and others, were conducted under the auspices of the Alexandria-Washington Lodge of Masons.

**"EAT CALIFORNIA RAISINS"**

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 30.—"Eat California raisins" was the slogan today throughout a large section of the country. Advice received from many points give evidence of a widespread observance of "Raisin Day," as a result of the concerted effort of the raisin growers of California to advertise their product and promote a large consumption of the fruit, which they claim is fully as nourishing as beef.

In order to acquaint the people at large with the value of raisins as an article of food thousands of pounds of the most delicious raisins grown in California were distributed free throughout the United States and Canada. Boxes of raisins were presented to President Taft, his cabinet members of Congress, governors of States and other public men throughout the land. The Southern Pacific, the Santa Fe and other railroads observed the day by making raisins a free item on the bills of fare in all their dining cars, and to further extol the virtues of the California product millions of stickers, posters and folders were distributed broadcast from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Canada to the Gulf. California at present produces about 120,000,000 pounds of raisins a year, but the growers believe that as a result of the publicity campaign now under way they will be able to find a profitable market for at least twice that amount.

**OUR U'REN IN CHICAGO AND TALKING MUCH**

**OREGON CITY SAGE TELLS WHAT WE AND WHAT WE SHALL BE.**

CHICAGO, April 30.—A prediction that the referendum will prevail in every state in the Union is made by Wm. S. U'ren of Portland, Ore., who is here to speak on the success of the movement in his home state.

"Every voter in the land has the ambition to be the 'big thing' in politics, and for that reason will vote in favor of the referendum," Mr. U'ren says.

"In Oregon, we were disposed to try out the complete plan of self-government and popular government has never been so nearly arrived at as in Oregon. We plan to have home rule in all cities and towns.

"Corrupt practices in elections have been eliminated in the state by the institution of the referendum. The most any candidate can spend is \$2,200 and that is in the case of a candidate for the United States Senatorship. Another point attained is that there is no grafting in the Legislature of Oregon. That has been absolutely abolished.

"In regard to the railroad propositions, Mr. Harriman is reported to have said that he had Oregon bottled. Next year an amendment is to be prepared which will give the people the right to buy and trade in property and it will not be long before the people of Oregon will demonstrate to the country that the people can equip and maintain a railroad as well as any corporation."

**DEAD AND UNKNOWN.**

CHICAGO, April 30.—The police have thus far failed to find any clue to the identity of a woman whose body was found in the Lincoln Park lagoon near "Suicide Bridge" wrapped in cloth and suspended from the neck by a string was a receipt to "Mrs. C. A. Lewis" for payment for a safety deposit box. The box, on being opened by a court order, was found to contain \$3750 in currency and two scraps of paper, one bearing the figure "2" and the other figure "8". The body had been in the water several weeks and the clothing and jewelry were undisturbed. The woman is believed to have been a stranger in Chicago.
