

# The Daily Market Report

**PORTLAND, May 5.**—Since the dip in wheat prices two weeks ago cereal has steadily gained in strength in the markets of the world, the trend of prices is still strong upward. To what points the market may go within the next few days this is a matter of conjecture, but at traders the world overlook for maintenance of unusually high prices, and in support of their position call attention to the admitted old shortage at this time. Statistics published by the London news show that the world's supply of wheat on April 17 was approximately 132,000,000 bushels, flour in 16,000,000 bushels less than a year ago. Beerbohm estimates shipments to Europe during the four months ending July 31, as 24,000,000 bushels from the United States, 16,000,000 bushels from Canada, 24,000,000 from Argentina, 30,000,000 from Russia, 20,000,000 from India, 6,000,000 from Australia and 650,000 from sundry other producing states. This would produce average weekly shipments of 7,200,000 bushels during the period. But against this, Beerbohm estimates weekly requirements of 9,400,000 bushels; the deficit of 2,200,000 bushels per week being 7,200,000 bushels per week, or the full amount of probable supplies. Locally the wheat market has undergone but little change in the past week, but it has lost none of its length, and if changed at all is in favor. For the demands of the coast side between now and the new crop season grain men and millers concede that there is in the Northwest little if any more than enough, and there is even a possibility of a shortage. Practically all the wheat now being marketed here goes to San Francisco, and sellers are not in the least inclined to make concessions in prices.
