

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, May 11.—With the advance of 2 cents announced by some of the city creameries today, raising the price of standard butter to 26 cents a pound, it would seem that the low point for the season had been reached and that the upward course of the market, which is always expected about this time of the year, has started. This may or may not be the case. It will all depend upon the supply and demand and the general condition of the Coast markets for the next week or two. The chances, however, are that the price announced today will hold and that the course of the market from this time on will be upward.

The new price given out by some of the creameries today is not yet uniform, some of the city makers still quoting slightly lower figures, but in the event the market continues as firm generally as now and current make works off as rapidly, the butter makers will probably be together at the higher price in the near future. At the low price prevailing the past week the butter market has been very active, especially with the city creameries, and it is reported that some of them have hardly been able to fill orders. At the same time, the country creamery trade, while not quite so active, has been far from sluggish, and the best of the outside brands have moved readily at city creamery prices.

this year starts at exactly the same date as a year ago. On May 11, 1908, standard city creamery went from 22 1/2 to 24 cents, and on May 19 there was another lift to 25. From that time on the course of the market was upward. A fact of interest this year is the advance in the price of butter at the time when production is heaviest. Current cream and milk receipts now are heavier than at any previous time this year. But at prices slightly higher than a year ago the Coast markets generally have held up well this year, and the tendency at all points is now distinctly upward.
