A New Haven special announces the arrival there last night of the iron steamer Norman Monarch, 26 days from Constantinople, bringing two handsome gray Arabian stallions given to Grant by the Sultan of Turkey. They are in fine condition, and will probably be sent to the owner's farm in the West. The Norman Monarch will take back to Constantinople 59,000 stand of arms for the Turkish government. The cargo will be worth about \$1,000,000.

The Cyclone.

Irving, Kansas, June 1.—Thirty deaths here are certain, and 53 people badly injured by the recent cyclone. People want money to get necessities which are at hand. From 50 to 60 families at Frankfort, Kansas, are homeless and destitute of clothing, provisions and farming implements. The citizens of that place donated \$700. More aid is needed.

Sabetha, June 2d.—Seventy-five to 100 persons here are destitute of everything. In the vicinity of Beattie, bedding and clothing is in great demand.

St. Louis, June 2.—A report comes from Brookville, Kansas, at least 75 miles southwest of Irving, the town where the most destruction took place, that a most terrific wind storm passed over the country northwest of there on Friday afternoon, doing great damage to farm property and killing several people. A cyclone also struck the outer edge of Kirksville, Adair county, Mo. Friday evening and demolished about a dozen houses and badly damaged several others and severely injured several persons, one woman being reported killed. A very high wind also prevailed north and northeast of St. Joseph, Mo. A grain elevator at Hopkins, Mo. was destroyed and several small dwellings, barns, etc., blown down, and an elevator at Craig Station on the K. C., St. Joe & Council Bluffs railroad, was destroyed. Considerable damage was done to other buildings. Trees were uprooted, fences and barns blown down, and crops damaged all along the line of the storm.

DEATH OF A. L. STINSON.—A private dispatch to Hon. I. R. Moores, received this morning, informed him that at 9 A. M. to-day his friend Stinson fell dead in the street, at Salem. Mr. Stinson had suffered from heart disease, and no doubt that caused his death. The deceased was widely known; had been a Grand Master of the I. O. O. F., and stood high in Masonry, having taken the Scottish Rite degree. He was also Grand Recorder of the newly instituted Order of United Workingmen. We should suppose that he was between 45 and 50 years of age. About 1860 he came to Albany, where he followed the printing business, and he probably was one of the best workmen at the art preservative in this state. In 1863 he was interested in the Albany Enquirer, a Democratic newspaper. In 1865 he removed to Salem, where he carried on a job printing office, and for two years did the state printing by contract. In 1868 he commenced the publication of the Willamette Farmer, which he sold in 1872. After this he was proprietor of a hosiery knitting factory at Jefferson; lived in Albany some years; returned to Salem to engage in job printing again in 1877, where he resided at the time of his death. These dates may not be exact, but are nearly so. Mr. Stinson has many friends who will regret to hear of his death. He married an adopted daughter of Judge S. D. Haly, of Linn county, and leaves a wife and four children, one being a son nearly grown.—Bee, May 28.
