COUNTY NEWS.

CATTLE MEN.—In a conversation with Mr. Overfelt the other day we ascertained from him that he and his partner, Mr. Sweetser, would remain in this valley only about ten days longer, unless they could buy cattle. He says they desire to purchase cattle in numbers from 2500 to 10,000 head, but cannot buy at a reasonable figure, so they may have to go elsewhere to purchase.

Our cattle men should look to their own interests and effect a trade with these gentlemen and by so doing open an avenue for other buyers who are contemplating a good place to go to buy large lots, but if Overfelt & Sweetser cannot buy in this valley it is as well for other shippers to consider it should be borne in mind that it is a long ways to drive cattle from here to Cheyenne, and cattle men have to buy so as to see their way through. Besides our ranches here can sell to them for cash down and take the money and before fall have a better herd than now. A dollar in your pocket is worth two in some other man's, so get it there as soon as possible. We seek of this because we want to see Grant county ranking No. 1 as a cattle county.

MINING NOTES.—From Mr. T. P. Dean we get the following items:

Number of Chinese stores in this vicinity, 10, of which Kam Wa Chung & Co. carry about \$100,000 in goods. Honz Chong & Co. carry \$30,000. The Chinamen have \$100,000 invested in mining apparatus on the John Day River near this place. They take out at one sweep of the derrick from \$100 to \$500 and make one sweep a week, and have 14 derricks in operation now and expect to have at least 5 more this season. They are opening up three claims at Wm. Luce's, which prosper well. The amount of lumber used by them during the season is over 400,000 feet. They propose to work the ground from John Daytown to the place of Mr. T. Thomas, ten miles below, as it pays well. He also informs us that not less than 600 Chinamen are at work on the claims below John Daytown, and more on the road.
