Homicide in Harney Valley.

FORT HARNEY, OGN., Sept. 1st. '79.

EDITOR NEWS:-Dennis Murphy foreman on Devine's ranch 15 miles from here, shot and killed James Vickers at the above place this morning. The facts of the case are these: It seems that Murphy ordered Chas' Vickers, trother to the deceased, out of his (Murphy's) camp a few days previous ly. Charles Vickers returned from this Post yesterday and visited Murphy's camp for the ostensible object of seeing his brother. Murphy ordered him t saddle up and leave. He replied that he would when Jim came. (meaning his brother) who returned in a short time. Both brothers then approached Murphy in a threatening macner, calling him all sorts of hard names. Murphy got up to defend himself and ws instantly covered GLASSWARE with a revolver in the hand of the deceased. Murphy was unarmed and fearing violence at the hands of the STATIONERY. Vickers, went and armed himself and returned to his camp this morning. Upon his arrival in camp there were none of the Vickers there except William who had no h nd in the aff ir. James Vickers come into camp this morain and was warned by his broth- and see for yourselves. er William to leave as Murphy was arned. It aprevs he did no heed the wirning as le went straight where Murphy was dismounted from his horse a d mide a motion as if to drive a pistol, Murp'y immediately dow his revolver and fixed five shots, four of all probability, if the road is which hit the deceased. These are the facts as near as I can learn. Murphy came to the Post and gave himself up to deputy sheriff Fitzgerald. He will have an examination before Justice Whether to-morrow.

LATER

The facts in the main are as stated except that young Vickers' friends claim that he was unarmed and that instead of making any demonstration he begged Murphy not to sh ot him.
