General News.

(From The Standard.)

VIRGINIA CITY, Jan. 16.—The Chronicle this evening publishes the following: In conversation Capt. John Kelly said that a very fine prospect had been encountered 80 feet below the 750 foot level in Lady Byron. At this point a hand drill was this morning driven in ten feet. The first four feet disclosed nothing, but the last six feet showed rock giving an average of \$20 to the ton—\$20 in silver and \$20 in gold. The rock is very hard and the ore at the bottom of the hole is of the same character as where first struck. There is no diamond drill in the mine and ten feet is about as far ahead as a hand drill can be sent. The best information from Union tonight is, that the east cross cut on the 2,400 foot level, has found good milling ore in that direction beyond the east clay of the present ore body, and beyond the horse of 12 feet of porphyry.

WALLA WALLA, Jan. 17.—The recent gale did much damage. All through the upper country fences were almost universally prostrated and some buildings wrecked. Probably \$50,000 worth of damage was done.

The railroad from Wallula to Celis, 110 miles in length, is located and contracts let. Men are now at work and more will be placed as soon as they can be procured. The country is now on the high road to prosperity and a very large emigration is expected this year. Let them come; there is room for thousands.

The firm of Chapman & Boyer located 16,000 acres of land last week for different parties.

More acreage is being plowed than ever before. Farmers are all plowing and, although it is now the middle of winter, the weather is warm and pleasant. The thermometer stands at 62 degrees in the shade.

The Columbia river is free of ice and a steamer is expected at Wallula today.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17.—Richard O'Sullivan, former publisher of the Freeman's Journal at Sydney, New South Wales, and latterly editor and proprietor of the Monitor in this city, died this morning at St. Mary's Hospital. He was a brother of Hon. A. M. O'Sullivan, member of parliament from Cork, and left his Australian venture with his brother, edited the Dublin Nation.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17.—(Review.)—A report is sent from the Legislature that the Rogers' bill is in the Legislature.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17.—A Solano superior court of the railroad track at the sea wall at North Beach, while attempting to jump on a locomotive this morning, lost his hold and fell between the tender and front car. Three cars passed over his arm crushing it to a perfect jelly. His injuries are probably fatal.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17.—Captain Peter Mackie has retired from the command of the steamship City of Chester and Captain Poleman succeeds him.

Owing to disgraceful dissensions among the members of the Patti Concert Troupe, the organization has disbanded and will go to Australia as intended.

The statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows an increase in specie of 4,076,000 marks.

The Idaho Democrat has not suspended as stated in our last. We judge from the tone of a recent issue that Jud. Boyakin is at the helm again. Mr. Boyakin is a good newspaper man and has our best wishes.—Avalanche.

THE TROUBLE IN MARSH BASIN.—From Mr. C. C. Hayne, Division Agent on the Overland road, we learn that a party of twenty men wearing masks, entered the house where Antonio and Mayo, the two Spaniards who commenced the shooting affray on New Year's eve, at Albion, in Marsh Basin, Cassia county, were confined and proceeded to shoot at the prisoners. The result was that the prisoners were wounded before the shooting could be stopped. The feeling in the community is very bitter against the Spaniards, and as there is no jail at Albion where they can be kept safely, the officers have taken the prisoners to Malad City, in Idaho county, where they will be safe from the danger of being lynched. Dr. Miller, son of Judge J. B. Miller, of this city, informed Mr. Hayne, that Nathan Harris, the man who was dangerously wounded in the first shooting affray, is yet alive with some hope that he will recover.—Idaho Statesman.
