A letter from Rev. McKean to the

Idaho Word:

"I am still at the hotel here in Baker

on the flat of my back. Last Tuesday

morning, while on the way from

Boise City to this place by stage, and

coming to what is known as the Black

Grade, three-fourths of a mile from the

Jett ranch, and about forty miles from

this place, one of the leaders fell, and

immediately the other leader fell over

him and off of the grade. The wheel-

ers could not hold the stage, and over

and down we went with a wonderful

crash and landed in a large mining

ditch, about thirty feet below, and two

or three feet above Burnt River. Mr.

L. Terrill, from Boise valley, Mrs.

Hardman, from Prairie City, Grant

county, Oregon, Miss Ella Allington,

from Boise City, and myself were all

inside. Mr. Terrill jumped from the

stage just as it left the grade, but the

rest of us remained inside, and, with

the stage came down on top of the hor-

ses. As soon as we struck the ditch I

crawled out. Next came Mrs. Hard-

man, but, on taking hold of Miss Ella,

we found that her left limb had been

thrust outside the stage and was lying

on the neck and shoulders of one of the

horses, and the stage holding her fast.

Fortunately the horses did not struggle

until we succeeded in getting her loose.

Our joy was irrepressible when we

found we were all alive and not serious-

ly hurt, though considerably sprained

and bruised. Then came the work of

rescuing the horses. As we pulled

them out one by one, three of them

jumped up and trotted off, but the

fourth was too badly hurt to get up and

a ball from a revolver in the hands of

one of the men on Jett's ranch put him

out of his suffering. Then, with thanks

of gratitude to God for his preserving

care of us while in such imminent dan-

ger, and of admiration of the pluck and

presence of mind of the driver, Mr. C.

Meriman, we left the place, and, with

wagons and sleds of various kinds, we

arrived in Baker about 10:30 o'clock

the same night. Miss Allington left

for La Grande yesterday morning to

attend the University, and last evening

at 6 Mrs. Hardman left for John Day

valley, but Mr. Terrill and myself were

too badly used up to go. My injuries

are confined to my back, Mr. Terrill's

to his left leg, right shoulder and face.

We will be well in a few days."

Articles of incorporation of the Burnt River Toll Road have been filed with the Secretary State.

The Hillsboro Independent denies the report that Mr. Guild proposes to start a paper at St. Helens.

Keatono & Klippel, on Poorman's creek, are working with a good head of water and prospects flattering.

A match game for \$100 a side was to take place at Salem last night between Josh Davis and W. F. Lowery.

John Jewett, a pioneer of Oregon, who came here in 1847, died at Astoria on the 22nd in the eighty-fourth year of his age.

Mr. Geo. W. Hume has disposed of his interest in the Hume and Ducun cannery, on Capt. Flavel's dock at Astoria, to the West Coast Packing Company.

The Astorian says that a man got his umbrella back by advertising it. That is the thinnest thing we have seen in that paper. It might occur in August, but not during the rainy season.
