THE POST.

We understand that the Post at Fort Harney is to be abandoned next May. If the above be true then we are at a loss to know why the authorities are so disposed to remove the post when the Indians are to be again placed on the reservation. Gen. Howard, Gen. McDowell and the other commanding officers know full well the feeling that exists in the hearts of the settlers in the Harney Valley, in fact of all the citizens of Grant county, towards the Indians and if the "Red Devils" are put on the Malheur reservation and the troops are removed from Harney, thus leaving our citizens without protection, that they will undoubtedly be their own protectors and, not only that but they will take it upon themselves to rid the country of the curse thus bestowed upon it and not a week, or perhaps a day, will pass that a dead Indian is not found. The stock men of Harney Valley have sworn to themselves to do all in their power to rid the Reserve of red men and you all know what that means—death. While we cannot blame the settlers of that portion of the county for avenging the wrongs done them by the Indians yet while they are strong and may kill an Indian "on the sly" there will be hundreds of poor innocent persons that will have to suffer to pay the penalty.

The Department should take into consideration that it will be necessary to keep a good force of soldiers at Ft. Harney to protect the Indians and at the same time protect women and children, for blood will be shed before the year ends if the Indians return to the Malheur Agency and the troops are removed.

We have heard our frontiersmen talk and know they will act, and the wisest thing that the proper authorities can do is either open the Reservation for settlement or station troops sufficient at Fort Harney to keep peace.

TO LANDCLAIMANTS.

The attention of all parties interested in homestead and pre-emption land cases is called to the following new circular of instructions just received by the Register and Receiver of the Land Office at La Grande. The changes therein specified are of importance to everyone having any land business to transact:

GENERAL LAND OFFICE,)
WASHINGTON, D. C. Jan. 17, 1880)
Registers and Receivers U. S. Land Office, Gentlemen: Referring to circular of April 15, 1869, requiring published notice of intention to make final proof in homestead and pre-emption cases, you are now instructed to require claimants in all cases hereafter to specify, in form No. 1, the day and date on which they will appear with witnesses for the purpose of making proof and, in homestead cases, they must give the official name and residence of the officer before whom the proof is to be made. You will also request each claimant to name four of his neighbors who may be able to testify as to his compliance with the law, any two of whom will be competent witnesses when proof is made. Such a course will prevent much inconvenience and delay. The post office addresses of the witnesses should be given in all cases. It is not sufficient to give the county only.

You will see that the foregoing requirements are incorporated in form No. 2, (Notice for publication) so that such notices will hereafter be substantially in the following form, viz:

"Notice is hereby given that the following named settler has filed notice of his intention to make final proof in support of his claim and secure final entry thereof and that said proof will be made before the Clerk of the Court of

Reed county at the county seat, on Thursday, the 22d day of April, 1880, viz: John Doe, homestead entry No. 3784, for NE q1 Sec 30, T 6, N R 20 E, and he names the following witnesses to prove his continuous residence upon and cultivation of said tract, viz: John Smith, Thomas Bundy, Peter Rinder all of Jay, Reed county, and Sam'l Small of Roscoe, Reed county."

Register.
The object of the law requiring such notice is to give to parties having adverse claims or filings, or to those having knowledge that the claimant has not complied with the requirements of the statutes, full notice of the time and place of presenting proof in order that opportunity may be given them to be heard prior to the perfection of an entry.

You will use the blanks on hand making the necessary alterations, until you receive new and revised blanks from this office.

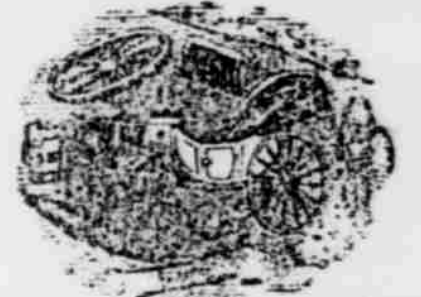
