NEUTRAL IN POLITICS UNDER ALL CIRCUMSTANCES.

PETTY TRIALS.—It very frequently occurs, especially in new counties like this, that trivial matters are dragged into court, numerous witnesses summoned, attorneys employed by the innocent estate, officers sent flying over the country in pursuit of imaginary evidence or known-thing jurymen. In fact about as much vim, bustle and noise is thrown into a sham case growing out of a neighborly quarrel as usually attaches to a first class murder trial. Costs are piled up to the tune of from fifty to five hundred dollars per case, which costs the county generally. Neighborhood quarrels should be settled by the neighbors. If you can't settle by arbitration it is better to form a ring and fight it out than to go into court.

SCHOOL APPORTIONMENT

PRAIRIE CITY, Ogn., March, 13th, 1880.

EDITOR NEWS:—Herewith please find report of the apportionment of the County and State funds to the schools of Grant County, on the 3d Monday in March, as directed by law.

There are 21 districts in Grant county and 1 partly in Grant and partly in Wasco counties. All have reported.

The fund now apportioned, contains the State fund allotted to this county last year, but too late for apportionment with the county fund, and not enough for a separate apportionment amounting to but five hundred dollars. The children over 4 and under 20 years of age reported in 1878 were 863; in 1879, 937; in 1880, 1030. Increase over previous year in 1879, 74; increase over previous year in 1880, 93.

The amount allotted to each pupil in this apportionment is \$2.0184, nearly, or within a small fraction of \$2.02.

Warrants on the treasury for amounts due districts, are drawn in all cases where the name of the clerk of the district is known. Districts numbered 8, 9, 13, 17, 18, 22 and 27 have failed to report names of officers elected at last annual school meeting, the 1st Monday in March, and it is therefore impossible to draw warrants in favor of these districts till they do report.

It is necessary that I should know to whom to make them payable.

Last year in similar cases warrants were drawn payable to the former clerk; but many were returned to this office and new ones had to be drawn when the name of the new clerk was ascertained. It is to be hoped that the clerks of the districts named will immediately send their names and Post-office addresses to this office that warrants may be drawn and transmitted to them at once, and the business of this apportionment closed.
