The bill introduced by Senator Slater to provide for the completion of the Oregon and California railroad is a copy of the bill recently introduced by Representative Whiteaker authorizing the Oregon legislature to designate the corporation to complete the road in case of failure by the present company within the specified time.

J. G. Abbot a promiuent cattle man of Grant county, Oragin arrived in town Saturday from the North. He says the past Winter has been the most severe on stock ever experienced in south eastern Oregon and northern Nevada. In Harney Valley and on the north side of Stein Mountain fully twenty-five per cent, of the cattle running at large have perished of cold and hunger. In Quin River Valley, on his way here, he was informed that on H. H. McColley's and Colonel Hardin's ranges, two hundred circusess of dead cattle could be seen within an area of a few square miles. - Silver State.

The Lakeview Examiner says: From H. L. Webb, mail carrier on the north. ern route, and who has recently come through from Prineville, we learn that on Beaver creek, Wasco county, in a circuit of fif een miles there are a thou sand head of cattle lying dead. The winter in that section of the state is reported as having been exceptionally severe, and the estimated loss of stock of all kinds will reach from fifty to seventy per cent. He reports the snow on the desert betwe n Silver Lake and Prineville to be from eighteen inches to three feet in depth.

The Inland Empire says: The foundation for the shop was blasted and surfaced on Wednesday last, and workmen have begun framing the building. There will be 120 box cars, 100 flats and a sufficient number of sleeping cars and first-class coaches to meet all the needs of a select passenger trade. The coaches now on the line between here and Celio will be used entirely for second-class passengers as soon as the line is open to Wallula, which Vice President Reed thinks will be about the 25th of September next. The boats between here and Portland will probably leave each end of their route about 9 A. M., leaving the journey between here and Walla Walla to be performed after night.

The post office at The Dalles has been enlarged and abditional mail facilities added.

Some people in Drew's valley, Lake county, failed to haul in sufficient fire wood last full and have lived by the warmth of fence rails for some time


