Russia is putting the nihilists through on the east iron regime, as usual.

Many Canadians are emigrating to Massachusetts and other eastern states.

Texas state troops had a fight with Mexican desperados; two Mexicans killed.

Grant has reached New Orleans and been received and entertained in the usual style.

Blaine men were in majority and sent delegates from Kansas to Chicago by a strong vote.

Goldwin Smith, an English philosopher, thinks Grant is notoriously devoid of administration merits.

Drought has passed over the fertile region of Cuba for three months past and has done immense damage.

Spain is anxiously watching Cuban affairs, and has paid out \$9,000,000 towards quelling insurrection.

The Surry open steeple chase was won by Bacchus, Mu-kadin second and Hephuloon third. Five starts.

Clearing house statements for last week, show great increase of trade. No especial tendency to stinginess.

Republicans in Massachusetts and elsewhere, are organizing a second ticket in case Grant gets a send off at Chicago.

The number of hogs packed in the west this winter was 6,950,000 an increase in number, but decrease in weight.

A motion to reconsider the vote by which the debris bill was passed failed to be carried. It was thought dangerous to hazard delay.

A bill before the California senate intends to prohibit aliens not capable of becoming voters from fishing in the waters of United States.

Disinterested democrats in New York are endeavoring to unite the fractions to secure united representation of the party at the national convention.

The vote of the San Francisco election stood an average of over 19,000 for citizens, against an average of 11,500 for workingmen, citizens majority averaging 7,346.

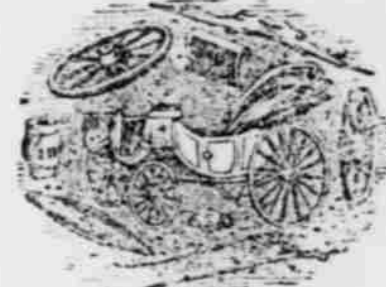
