THE DE YOUNG MURDER.

The fearful tragedy of last Friday in the California metropolis is the car sheaf upon the aggregated stock of bad morals and wretched society that has cursed that once happy and opulent city. On the one hand, we find a so-called gospel minister, who has deserted God for Mammon and yet cannot serve Mammon with decency, haranguing a ruffian mob at the sand-lots and placing himself on a level with those who are tired of work and want men to divide with them the money they have amassed by prudence, thrift and self-denial.

On the other hand a young and energetic journalist, desirous of becoming suddenly rich, committs the fortunes of his paper to the fortunes of a party which that paper was mainly instrumental in creating. Seeing that defeat was inevitable, he devotes his paper to expounding the record of the blackguard ecclesiastic. The latter retorts in language unfit for the ears of anything but thieves and courtisans, and the journalist shows him, but does not kill him, nor is the pity. Mistakenly by false epistolary sympathy, the people of the second commercial city in America, elect the blackguard priest as Mayor of that city.

Now comes the approaching trial of De Young for shooting Killoch, and all eyes are turned up to the journalist who returned from the East laden with the proofs of Killoch's indecency and villainy in his former place of residence. Knowing very well he will be proven a swindler and every thing else that is low and disgraceful, it is determined to rid San Francisco of the journalist. The sequel is known. In his own office, but entirely by his energy and ability, Charles De Young was brutally slaughtered.

In days gone by we were employed as writer on the Chronicle and saw many things we did not like. But it was not our paper. We found Charles De Young exacting in his requirements and punctual in his payments; and those are good men to work for. In all the long and dreary eleven months of drudgery in that office, not a single unkind word escaped his lips toward us. And he was a man that had no pets. He judged men merely as they performed the duty set to them. And if all the rest of his life were an unbroken tissue of sin, his devotion to his aged mother commended it all, in our opinion. As an enterprising journalist, he had no equal on this coast, if in America.

It is a deplorable state of affairs that brings about such tragic occurrences. It is bad enough to think of a man being shot dead for a real injury, but when it comes to being shot dead by a defaulting official for exposing his crimes, as well as those of his father, the case looks even darker. In the mean time things are growing no better. The thieves and bummers of Killoch's ilk won't go; the Chinese won't go; the capitalists on whom depends the vitality of the State, will not go. And San Francisco's decent, sober and industrious citizens will be the only real sufferers.—Inland Empire.
