Annual Session of the Grand Encampment of the State.

The Grand Encampment of the I. O. O. F. for the state of Oregon met in Portland on last Monday, in its annual session at Old Fellows Temple, forty-three delegates being present. The following officers of the Encampment were present at the opening of the session: E. H. Stolte, M. W. G. P.; W. S. Newberry, M. E. G. H. P.; E. D. Burton, R. W. G. S. W., pro tem.; J. M. Bacon, R. W. G. Scribe; I. R. Moore, M. W. G. Treasurer; J. C. Church, G. J. W.; W. J. Beatty, S.; Joseph Weber, D. G. S.; O. T. Barker, W. G. Marshal, pro tem.

The report of the various officers was submitted and referred to the various committees. The following officers of the Encampment were elected for the ensuing year: W. S. Newberry of No. 1, M. W. G. P., E. L. Bristow, R. W. G. S. W.; J. M. Bacon, R. W. G. Scribe; I. R. Moore, R. W. G. Treasurer; P. Metschan, R. W. G. J. W.

Charles Pope, of Cleveland, Ohio, has lost six children by diphtheria, within a short time. One son of ten years survives.

A riot was recently threatened in Wayne county, Ohio, in consequence of the employment of colored men in the mines.

Yesterday morning a meeting of the Oregon Navigation Company was held at the office of E. G. Hughes, at which the following gentlemen and the following officers were elected: President, William Reid; Vice President, Kenneth Macleay; Attorney, E. G. Hughes; Secretary and Treasurer, Robert Bell. A resolution was passed confirming the purchase of the City of Salem and Ohio made for the company and these boats ordered transferred to it. The owners of the steamers surrendered their papers at the custom house yesterday and the necessary transfer will be made to day.—Standard, May 18.
