General News.

CHICAGO, June 17.—Mayor Harrison's recent visit to Horatio Seymour was apparently made in his own interest as vice presidential candidate, and apparently resulted in Seymour giving him most positive assurance that he was no candidate and would under no circumstances accept a nomination. Harrison, however, evidently became convinced that Seymour would accept if nominated, and does not hesitate to say so.

NEW YORK, June 17.—An evening paper publishes a Cincinnati dispatch as follows: The Commercial's Syracuse special says that Seymour has decided to accept the presidential nomination it tendered.

PHILADELPHIA, June 17.—The president-to-be appointed ex-Gov. J. F. Hartranft collector of customs for Philadelphia.

BURLINGTON, June 16.—The eleventh annual meeting of the Society of the Army of the Potomac took place here today. Gen. Sheridan arrived this morning, also Gen. Nelson A. Miles and many other eminent soldiers. Veterans present number about 400. The reunion is a complete success. The city is profusely decorated. Special trains run in all directions, bringing in spectators numbering about 15,000. An address of welcome was delivered by Daniel Roberts, city attorney of Burlington, to which Daniel E. Sikes, President of the Society of the Army of the Potomac, responded.

NORTH ADAMS, June 17.—A terrible scourge resembling dysentery is prevailing in Adams, which has so far baffled the skill of physicians. Over a thousand persons, old and young, have been stricken down. Physicians are busy night and day. Many cases, it is feared, will be fatal. There is little doubt that the epidemic is occasioned by impurities of the water in the reservoirs.

LEADVILLE, June 16.—Indications are that the strike is about to be amicably settled. The miners hold a final meeting to-morrow morning, at which Gen. Crook and staff will be present. The miner's union executive committee have drawn resolutions that they claim mine owners have accepted, and this meeting is called for the purpose of submitting the resolutions of the union.

DENVER, June 16.—Governor Pitkin has advised from Leadville that a compromise has been agreed on between strikers and mine owners and managers, and that the militia will be disbanded Friday. The basis of the compromise is not yet announced.

CHICAGO, June 16.—The Journal's Washington special says: A letter has been produced from Jere Black dated in 1874, in which he completely vindicates General Garfield from any wrong in connection with the credit mobilizer matter. Mr. Black says Garfield was evidently deceived by Oakes Ames, and says that his (Garfield's) integrity depended upon the question whether he acted with his eyes open. If he had known the true character of the proposition made to him he would not have endorsed it, much less embraced it.

Mr. Stindler, of Waldo hill, lost a fine mare valued at \$500.

A German Reformed Church is being built in the Waldo hills. Rev. J. Mulchapt pastor.

The commencement exercises of Christian College, Monmouth, came to an end Wednesday evening, June 16th.

The Ashland Tidings says peach trees have suffered severely in Southern Oregon from the severe winter.

The Inland Empire says Mr. Glenn has four bricks being erected at The Dalles, and E. P. Fitzgerald talks of erecting another.

A larger vote was polled at the late election in Clackamas county than at that two years ago in this county. The total vote for congressman in 1878 was 1796; this year it was 1948, an increase of 152.

The Mountaineer says John Leney was found on the bank of the river with a bullet hole in his head and died shortly after. He was about 35, said to be an industrious, hardworking man—sick of life.

The Smith County, Kansas Pioneer of May 31, says: An immigrant train of seventy teams passed up the Republican, last week, en route for Oregon and Washington Territory. Two printing offices were with the outfit.

Two families, composed of friends and relations from California, Massachusetts and Vermont will locate at Hood River, the Mountaineer says, if they find desirable locations there. They are represented as well to do citizens.

John Mathews, of Egle Point, left Jackson county Wednesday with a drove of 75 or 80 fine horses, which he is taking from the Butte creek country to Walla Walla. He was accompanied by Lewis Reese and several others whose stock were in the same band.

The body of another drowned man washed ashore yesterday, just as the tug was leaving Fort Stevens. Dr. Baker says it had the appearance of having been in the water but a short time. On one arm was stamped three letters. A coroner was sent for and the body awaiting an inquest when the steamer left.

The Enterprise says: Paquet's house, occupied by Chas. Dauchey, burned Wednesday morning at about 8 o'clock. The house and shop near were totally consumed. The greater portion of the contents of both buildings were saved. Mr. Dauchey has had a deal of bad luck, with sickness and death in his family. The loss to Paquet is about \$300.

Dry Lake, in Lake County, about 12 miles from Tule Lake, which has only held water two or three times since the country has been occupied by white people, is now a large lake in reality as well as in name.

The Appeal says as surveyor Quinton was running a line for the narrow gauge through French Prairie, a party named Thompson brought out his gun and made them leave off work.

The Appeal says Vice-President Kohler, of the O. & C. R. R., and Mr. P. Shu'ze visited that town last week looking after railroad interests. They were to travel through the Waldo hills.

At Co's Bay, the News says, the eleventh crib has been sunk, making a wall 550 feet long and work will now cease for want of means. A little more rock would materially help the harbor.
