THE WARM SPRINGS.—On last Saturday after seeing our family and also W. H. Clark's safely seated and started en route for the "Warm and Cold Sulphur Springs" we mounted the hurricane deck of the riding horse belonging to our friend, O. P. Crisp, and proceeded to follow. We arrived at the Springs about one o'clock, and found a hearty meal in waiting which all did justice to.

The situation of this summer resort is superb, beautiful. On the east and south runs the beautiful John Day, on the west the Boise road, and the entire place is surrounded by elegant mountain scenery and pine forest. The house is guarded on the west and south by large fruit, flower and vegetable gardens, on the north a cooling stream and shady grove greet the eye, on the east is a lovely grassy lawn that slopes gradually down to the springs and bath houses. The springs are truly a great curiosity, the sight of which is worth many miles travel, to say nothing of the benefit derived by bathing in them. In the hot lake or spring the water is continually boiling and bubbling up, while but two or three feet west is another one that is extremely cold; thereby furnishing the thirsty with a hot or cold "tody" as best suits. From these springs flumes are run to the bath houses where the bathers can have a red hot, an almost ice cold or a bath just suited to their feeling.

Many other sulphur springs are to be found on the ranch.

With riding, fishing, hunting, music, &c., &c., a person can spend a few months very swiftly. On the premises are good barns, houses, a large dance hall, and out-houses of every description. In fact it is one of the most desirable dairy farms we have ever seen on the Pacific slope, and then take into consideration its advantages as a summer resort and some good business man can make a "strike" by investing in the place.
