The Heyman-Marriner Campbell Company are moving to full houses at the The Royal at Victoria.

The Republicans left in the French Corps Legislature have pronounced for annexation in both houses.

Gen. Canfield has been at Harrisburg, and Senator Cameron met him there, and they went west together.

The board of supervisors of San Francisco, have cut down the estimate of the auditor for the coming year \$30,000.

It is claimed the Hartman affair has in no way complicated the friendly relations between France and Russia.

Capt. Howgate has fitted up the Gulf as an arctic vessel, a personal enterprise of his own at his own expense, to leave soon from some eastern port.

Gen. Hatch wants permission to follow Victoria's Indians over the Mexican border, and the state department is trying to get consent of the Mexican government.

Citizens at Silver City, New Mexico, are famishing for want of food, owing to the rail road made by Victoria's Indians. Freight teams are either delayed or lost.

It is the intention of President Hayes with his son Webb to start for the Pacific coast as soon as business at Washington will allow, which will probably be within two weeks.

The U.S. revenue cutter, Wolcott, with the American consul on board, will go to Clifton Sound on the 26th inst. with presents for the Indians who rescued and saved the crew of the wrecked ship General Cobb, last year.

Conservative and Republican papers in Paris have pronounced for amnesty, and Gambetta says both the provinces and Paris have accepted amnesty as a necessity. The cause is favored by the quietness of 4,000 amnestied persons now in Paris.

An attempted uprising of troops in the Cuban fortress at Havana has been suppressed. Six of the mutineers were shot. An attempt to capture arms, etc., was unsuccessful. The cause of the uprising was the non-payment of troops during the last six months.
