General News.

Census returns give the population of San Francisco as 233,066, including 20,549 Chinese.

Superintendent Walker intends to have complete returns from all the Indian tribes by officers of the army.

The funeral of W. T. Pelt on, Gov. Tilden's nephew, was held at Grammercy Park, and was largely attended.

The Cabinet have concluded to expend the River and Harbor Appropriations as fast as the War Department may consider desirable.

Phillip Schumard and wife were crossing a railroad track near Salinger, Pa., in a carriage and were killed by the Niagara express train.

Edward Stanley, the only son of Judge Stanley, of Napa, California, was fatally shot by the accidental discharge of his gun when hunting.

Complaint is made against U. S. Marshal Fitzsimmons of Georgia, that he has proved an obstruction to the enforcement of the revenue laws.

The French Senate have passed the Amnesty Bill with an amendment excluding from its benefits incendiaries and assassins, condemned after due trial.

Capt. Payne and 300 men from Southern Kansas, have made a raid in the Indian Territory and defy the Government. The same man made a similar raid last Spring and he and his companions were ejected by the military.

A dispatch from Berlin says the opinion prevails in political circles here that the Porte will decline to accept the resolutions of the conference, and that it will be impossible to prevent bloodshed between Turkey and Greece.

James K. Kinkead has sued the Reno Evening Gazette for \$15,000 for publishing speeches made at a meeting of creditors of the Reno Savings Bank, Tuesday evening, and fact in connection with the failure. Kinkead was manager of the bank.

Thirty-nine railroads have made a report of the earnings for six months past and show a gain over 1879 of \$4,784,359. Thirty-three roads report a gain of about \$17,000,000 in their earnings for the past 12 months on the preceding 12 months.

Gladstone says the English policy towards Turkey is to insist in the fulfillment of the Berlin treaty, and do not believe the Porte will oppose it to the voice of Europe. Meantime the Porte is loading transports with troops and ammunition, and forbids the disembarkment of 4,000 soldiers in Thessaly whose time has expired.

The state of Turkey is indicated by the fact that when Hassan Pasha ordered a general disarmament, Eyoub Bey, one of the most fanatical Mussulmans, with several followers, went to him and protested against the measure. Hassan Pasha replied by striking Eyoub Bey with a stick, whereupon the followers of the latter threw themselves upon Hassan and he was taken to Mitroviza it was thought mortally wounded.

Bert Houston, son of W. D. Houston, of Junction, cut his foot last Friday while chopping in the woods, in a very serious manner. The axe glanced by striking a brush in front of him and split his foot between the first and second toes, making a gash that reached nearly to the instep.

The Albany Democrat is urging the farmers of Linn county to have a county fair this Fall.

The Lakeview Herald thinks that losses of stock in Linn county last winter, will not exceed twenty per cent.

Last Sunday the camp meeting of the Christian Church at Brownsville, which has been running for about three weeks, closed, having received thirty odd new members.

Mr. Churchman, of Willamina, was very badly hurt by being thrown from a buggy by a runaway team, but not dangerously. A Mrs. Baily, who was in the buggy at the time, escaped without being hurt.

In Harriburg precinct there are 167 farms. In Harriburg there are six manufacturing establishments. Population of the town is 422; of the precinct 1,274. During the twelve months preceding June 1st, there were 8 deaths and 48 births.

Th. C. Willis G. says: Among the many improvements in our city are the Presbyterian and M. E. Church buildings each a new parsonage, J. C. Taylor, E. W. Fisher and J. H. Lewis, each a new dwelling house.

A son of B. Ellmaker, of Long Tom, who is about ten years old, met with a serious accident by the boy opening a gate and it falling over on him. We are informed that it broke one arm in two places, one leg twice, his collar bone and two ribs.

James C. West sent to the June 1st Republican specimens of wheat, rye and timothy, hard to beat. The heads are pumpkins and well filled; the stalks are healthy and big rye. The ears are eight feet tall, and wheat six feet five inches and the timothy five feet five inches, the heads eleven inches long.

S. V. Van der Meulen says that Henry Fisher, of Dayville, is wanted by the Sheriff to answer a charge of attacking the property of Robert B. Co. of Dayville. The information was given before Justice Maxson, about a week ago. Fisher, to save, got the blame, sold the property and fled in the direction of the Lake Valley, coasting to Harney Lake with deputy Sheriff Smith in hot pursuit.
