PRairie City, Ogn., July 27, 1880.
The "Union" National Liberal League of Prairie City, Oregon, met at the Grange Hall on Saturday, July 24, at 5 o'clock, P. M. INDIAN SCOUTS.—General Howard has ordered that Lieutenant Farrow enlist twenty Indian scouts and twenty picked soldiers, for a company for the purpose of making a scouting column, for service whenever needed in this department. This has been greatly needed for some years, and the good service performed by Lieutenant Farrow last Summer proves him to be the man for the command. These scouts will be a continuous service, and will doubtless prove very serviceable. Lieutenant Farrow arrived at Pendleton on Sunday last, and has commenced enlisting his Indians.

The Portland "Mercury" has an article asking that there shall be reviews of certain cases passed upon by the late appointed supreme court. We cannot but agree that the "Mercury" is essentially correct. The great majority given the new judges was undoubtedly brought about by the bad decisions of the last court. WHAT IS THE BEST SHEEP?

ED. AMERICAN STOCKMAN.—The great question among sheep men at the present time is, which is the most profitable breed? To answer this we must take into consideration the mutton, the wool, and the adaptability to our climate. We find that the Cotswolds are not healthy in large flocks, that the Merinos though healthy, and great producers of wool, yet amount to very little as mutton sheep. Then the Downes are splendid for mutton, but light dry shewers. Now by a judicious crossing of these breeds we get a sheep that fills the bill in every respect, as the markets are at present. A heavy shearer of medium of delains wool which brings the highest price. The mutton is fit for any English market, while the active habits and improved constitution of the sheep renders them good feeders either on grass or grain; in getting up this cross, I would take the best Cotswold ewe and use a large French Merino ram; then on the produce of these breed a Shropshire or Southdown ram.

There was a test made of the different breeds two years ago, by Andrew Oliver of Stark county, Ill. On a flock of Cotswold ewes he used a French Merino a Cotswold, and a Southdown ram, and found that the lambs from the Southdown took the lead till they were six months of age, then the Cotswolds led till they were ten months old, but at a year old the Merino cross was equal in carcass and sheared ten and a quarter pounds of wool of superior quality, while the others averaged ten pounds.

Mr. Conley, the great sheep buyer at the stock yards, made the remark the other day that the "Merino crosses were almost as fine formed as the Southdown."

I throw out these few remarks with the hope that others more able may be induced to give the public their experience in the matter of sheep breeding. Tullon, Ill. H. H. GRAY.

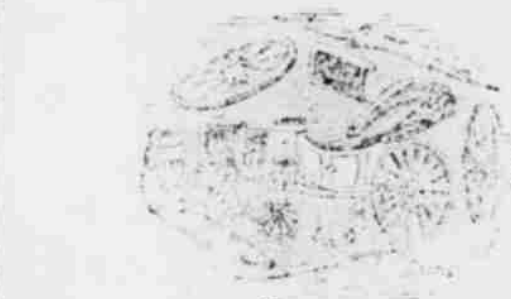

WOOL.—The market continues gradually to improve, especially for valley wool, sales of which have been made during the past week at 29 to 30 cents per pound. Eastern Oregon, when of choice quality, has also participated in the advance, but heavy and dirty wools are not much inquired after, and then only at the old price. Best qualities will sell at from 26 to 28 cents, and numbers two and three will bring from 20 to 24 cents.—Dec, July 23d.
