HARNEY ITEMS.

FORT HARNEY, Aug. 1st, 1880.

EDITOR NEWS:—A letter has been received by a gentleman of this place from the immaculate Sarah, in which she says that the Indians are not to return to the Malheur Agency for some time. The reason she assigns for their not coming is that the Secretary of the Interior has been appised of the hostile attitude assumed by the people of this country toward the Piutes, and that under the present circumstances he deemed it advisable that they should remain where they are, or words to that effect. If the Secretary of the Interior wishes that the Piutes shall increase and multiply their species—and doubtless he does—his action in not sending them back here now goes a long way to prove that he has a level head. Meanwhile improvements are going on at the Agency on a large scale. Teams, heavily laden with timber from French's mill pass here at frequent intervals for that place, and freight teams are on the road from Winnemucca with supplies for there. The average Harney citizen isn't worrying himself much about the outcome of the presidential election, nor is he losing any sleep figuring out Dr. Tanner's chances of being able to stick it out for forty days without grub. The question that agitates the Harney citizen at present is to get his lass rope on the "oveana" and put his brand on it. "Oveana" is the name given by stockmen to an orphan calf that is not branded, which there was an unusually large number this season, and, it is needless to say that there were a great many who wanted to adopt them.

Doctor Anderson, the genial host of the Stein Mountain House, had a ludicrous mishap befall him day before yesterday. A party of emigrants en route to Montana, camped at his place on that day, and they were so delighted with the scenery and the many kind attentions shown them by the proprietor that they concluded to lay over for a couple of days. One of the party, a buxom widow of forty, twitted the doctor on the lonely life he was leading and pictured to him the happiness that would ensue if he only had a wife and a young family growing up around him. She was enthusiastic in her praise of the choice location he had, saying, what a perfect Paradise for a woman to live in! The Doctor, thus encouraged, invited the widow to ride out with him to see his place, to which she readily assented. The pair took a seat in a Bain wagon behind "Tobe" and "Chub," a spirited and favorite team of his. After seeing everything of interest on the farm they were returning home, but Doc., who was paying more attention to the fat widow than to the horses, dropped one of the lines and the team started on a dead run for home. Turning the corner of a fence the wagon was upset and the pair spilled on the grass, but fortunately no one was injured in the least. Legal Notice of the application of Milton Stevens for a United States Patent for Placer Claim, No. 108.

E. 2 chains to the intersection of Granite and Bull Run Creeks, thence in the same direction 4 and 50 chains to a mineral monument, being a rock marked M. M. thence in same direction 3 chains to a rock marked S. W. C. being the south west corner of claim and described as to Boundaries as follows: Commencing at said rock marked S. W. C. extending thence S 70 deg. E 10 chains to a rock marked S. F. C. being the Southeast corner of said claim, thence N 20 deg. E 20 chains to a rock marked N. E. C. being the northeast corner of said claim thence N 70 deg. W 10 chains to rock marked N. W. C. being the Northwest Corner of said claim, thence S 70 deg. 

Tired Women.

* All through the country one meets with tired, care-worn women who seem to have entirely lost health hope and ambition. They are forced in the position of drudges, and, too often, meet with no sympathy from their husbands, who sneer at the idea of woman's work being so burdensome when they remember their own laborious tasks. But sneering does not lessen the labor of the wives to whom kitchen, pantry, milk room, dining room, suggest drudgery. The man has a constant change of scene with all the excitement incident thereto. He goes from breakfast to the plow, the harrow, and the constantly varying duties of the farm. His meals are prepared for him, and after supper he can enjoy his pipe in peace, his work over for the day. But with his wife it is different. Early in the morning she rises to kindle the fire, dress the children, cook breakfast, wash the dishes, send the children to school, get the dinner, wash the dishes—and if there is a moment to spare between dinner and supper, spend it in sewing—get supper, wash the dishes, put the children to bed—and if a moment more offers, to sew, besides taking care of the morning and evening milk, churning and working butter, and a hundred things that must be done every day, in exactly the same way and order. She has no time for pleasure. She does not attend any lodge or society meeting; she visits a neighbor but very seldom, "she's so busy," she does not walk out after tea to meet a friend to drive away care by social converse; her duties vex her till bedtime, when anxious and careworn, it's long ere she can sleep, or if she can the teething baby or the sick child demands her care; and she may spend half the night in quieting it to be roused from a troubled sleep all too soon to recommence the weary routine. Is it any wonder that farmer's wives so often leave the scene of the thankless toil for the insane asylum?
