Clatsop county shows the largest proportionate gain, over 348 per cent. Wasco comes next, having increased over 307 per cent. Polk and Benton show the smallest increase, 38 per cent. The five counties east of the Cascades Baker, Grant, Umatilla, Union and Wasco, have increased from 18,032 to 35,347, over 171 per cent; the six southern counties, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine and Lake, from 14,736 to 29,079, over 97 per cent; Clatsop, Columbia and Tillamook from 2,526 to 8,878, over 250 per cent; the nine counties in the Willamette Valley from 61,169 to 102,231, over 67 per cent.
