For some time past the Walla Walla Statesman and the Town Talk, also published in that city, have been engaged in the publication of personal paragraphs which on Sunday evening culminated in a shooting affray. Just before dusk Frank Parker, editor of the Statesman and M. Harris, owner of the Town Talk, both of whom are well-known in this city, met on Third street, Walla Walla, and engaged in a controversy, during which Harris drew a pistol and fired at Parker, the shot fortunately missed the aim and left the doughy Colonel of Indian war fame unharmed. The altercation grew out of the publication in the Town Talk of an article reflecting on Mr. Parker. Both men were promptly arrested and taken to jail but were liberated on giving the required bail. Yesterday morning Harris was tried on the charge of assault and battery and was acquitted; Parker has made another complaint against Harris, charging him with assault to kill, and the result is yet to be determined.—Portland Standard.

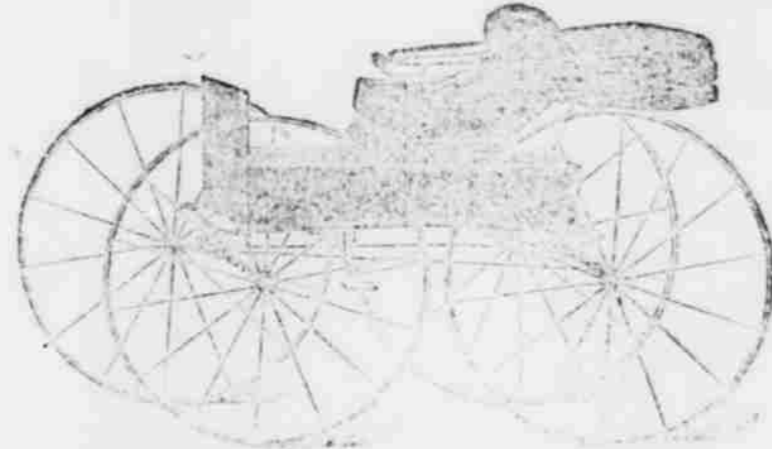

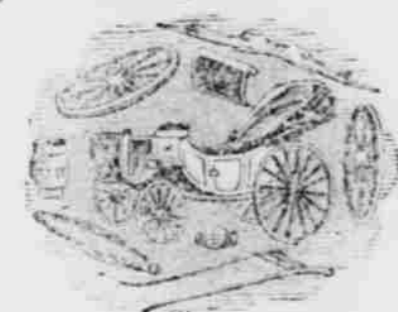
