THE HORSES.

At the kind solicitation of Mr. Palmer on last Monday we in company with C. W. Parrish, and Judge Dustin took a ride to the race track, and at the first stable found Martin McClure with "Lost Boy," a beautiful sorrel, 3 years old, with four white feet and a white nose. Also "Bango" a 2 year old, sorrel with white hind feet. Both were sired by Wilks, and you can bet money on them. Next is "Web." Anderson's stable is next and where will be found a fine iron grey stallion, 6 years old, and shows good care. M. S. 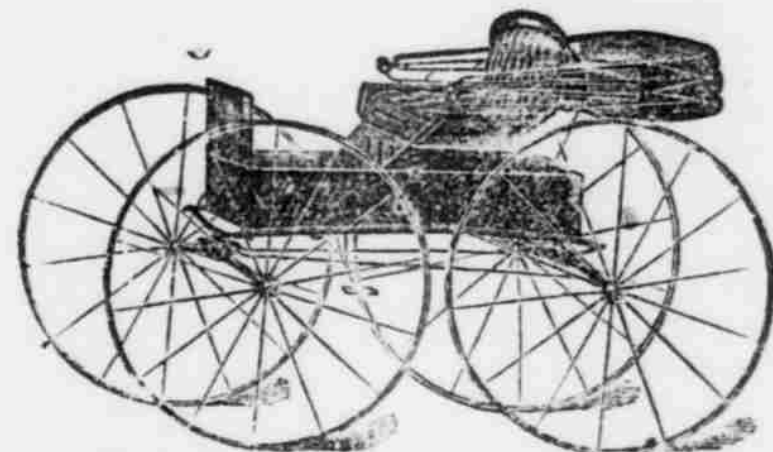

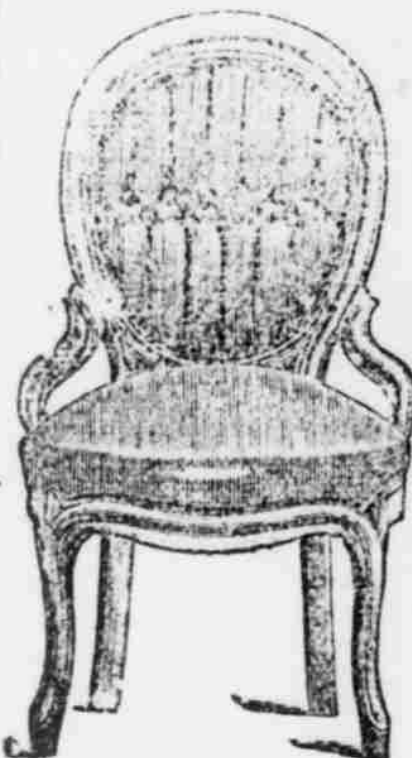

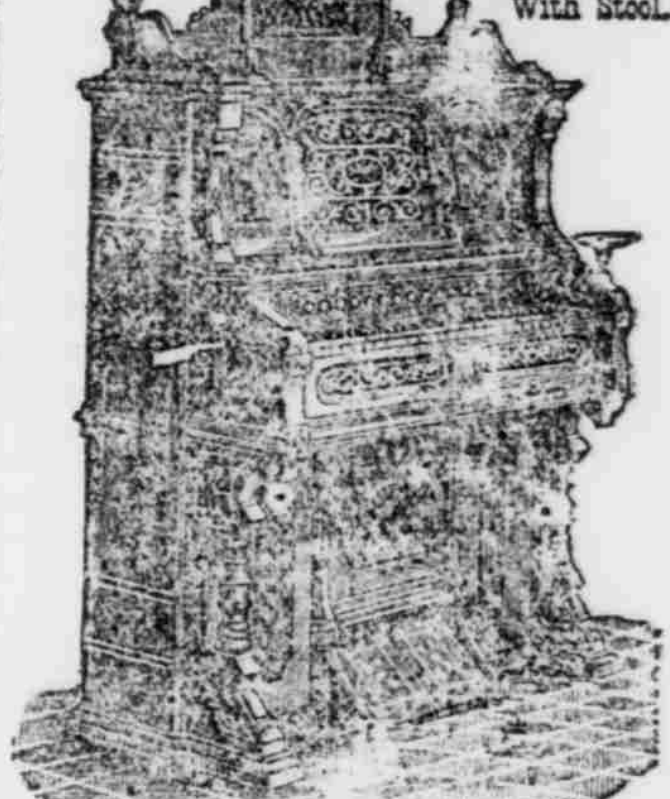
