P. A. Golden was fatally shot by John Doolittle, near Denver, on the 6th instant.

Thos. Hughes inaugurated a colony on the line of the Cincinnati Southern railroad.

Chas. Milthew, in Pottsville, Pennsylvania, shot his wife on the morning of the 6th, and then killed himself.

Two men were killed and four injured while knocking the props out of a tile kiln at Gibson, Ill., on the 6th.

Another six pounds of the ancient and mysterious beeswax, that has so frequently washed up on the coast for the past two decades, was taken to Astoria by the Alpha on Monday.

Enterprise: Robert Birnie and niece were visiting at Mrs. Dr. Barclay's last Monday. Mr. Birnie came to Oregon before 1830, and is consequently one of the oldest settlers now in Oregon, and probably knows more of its early history than any man living.

The M. E. Church at Cornelius was dedicated last Sunday. The building cost \$2700, of which Hon. T. R. Cornelius gave \$850, Mr. Nestor \$500, Mr. McNutt \$350 and D. Williams \$150. The remainder was subscribed in smaller sums. Fully 350 persons were present at the dedication services.

It is estimated that 115,000 bushels of wheat are stored in the various warehouses of Eugene.

The barrel factory at Puyallup employs 30 white men and about the same number of Chinese.

Six steam threshers, averaging a hundred sacks of grain each day, are busy at work on the flats about La Conner.

The general triennial convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, opened on the morning of October 6th, in St. George's Church, New York City.

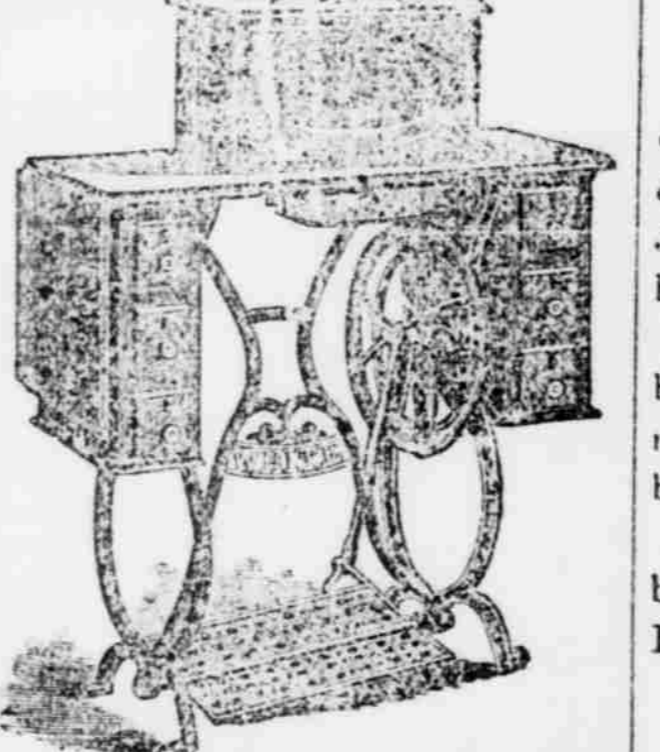
