Now, we propose to make a proposition to a portion of the citizens of this County. It is this: Every business man in this town, John Day, Harney and a portion of the business men of Prairie City have advertised in this paper and while doing good for the paper did good for themselves and the county. Now, we propose that every merchant that is doing business in the outside towns try the paper by advertising for a while, at least. Let the outside world see that we have stores in various points in the County. Let all the farmers that are able subscribe and pay for from one to five copies of the News and send to friends in the East. In fact let the citizens of the County that have not yet advertised or subscribed do so at once. We are going to build this Fall, and after that is done we propose to make some improvements in our office to the advantage of the County and ask that the citizens that have not yet advertised or subscribed to do so at once and help the County.

Womans' Suffrage Association.

At a meeting of the Grant County Woman Suffrage Association held in the M. E. Church of Canyon City, Nov. 10th 1880, the following proceedings were had:

1st, The reading of a constitution for the Association.

2nd, The signing of those who approved the constitution.

3d, Its unanimous adoption by the signers.

4th, The election of officers.

5th, The officers elected:

Mrs. P. Kuhl was unanimously chosen President and Mrs. M. L. Olmsted was chosen Vice President by a similar vote.

Major Magone was chosen recording secretary and Miss Mary Doullit corresponding secretary.

Mrs. H. R. Sels was unanimously chosen Treasurer.

An Executive Committee on motion was appointed, by the Chair, composed of M. V. Thompson, Mrs. Dr. Hersley and Mrs. Chas. Gray.

A Committee of 3 were also appointed by the Chair, composed of M. L. Olmsted, Mrs. Minnie Southworth and Rev. G. E. Wilcox, on resolutions.

No. 1. Resolved, That we will use all honorable means to induce the voters of Oregon to assist us in adopting the Womans Suffrage Resolution, and in giving woman an equal interest in the Nation's prosperity and welfare.

No. 2. Resolved, That we look confidently to the Legislature of 1882, for the ratification of the action of the Legislature of 1880, on behalf of woman's enfranchisement, claiming the ratification not as a concession, but as a right.

3rd. Resolved, That our thanks are due to the Oregon Legislature of 1880, for their just and generous action in submitting a Woman's Suffrage Resolution to the next Legislature for ratification.

4th. Resolved, That we tender thanks to the law makers of the State and Nation for every inalienable right they have yet accorded to woman, and we wait patiently, and hopefully for the time when they will confer the elective franchise upon every tax-paying American citizen of proper age, without regard to sex.

5. Resolved, That we recognize the right of political equality by all citizens, irrespective of sex, as an inalienable right and essential to National political prosperity.

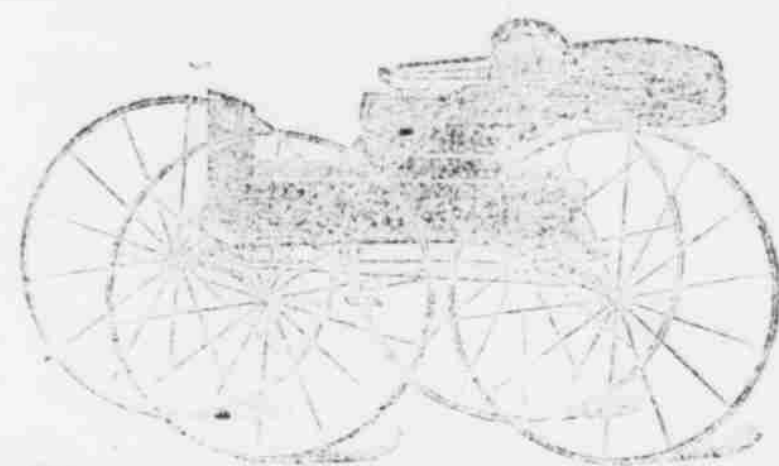

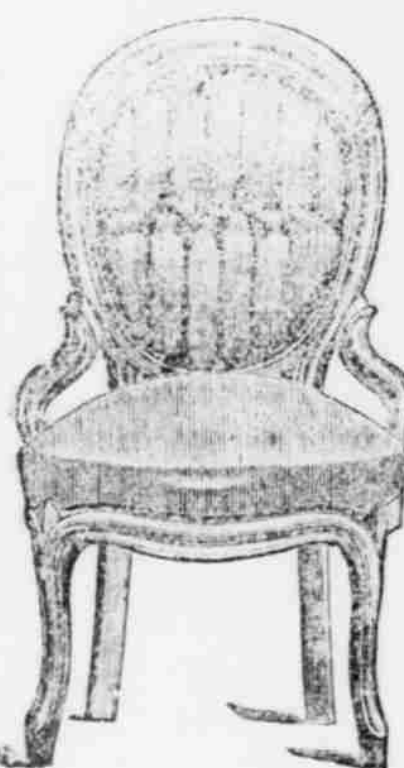
