THE LARGEST IN THE WORLD.—The O. R. & N. Co's dock is being extended 325 feet, and including the old wharf, will, when finished, have a total width of 675 feet. The increased size of the mammoth dock was deemed necessary to accommodate the accumulating traffic between Oregon and California. The present addition will enable one steamer to load whilst another is discharging. The wharf is about fifty feet longer than the Ainsworth dock. Mr. Thurber, of New York, who is repented by Messrs. C. H. Lewis and Donald McCleay, to be the largest merchant in the universe, says the Ainsworth dock is the largest in the world and the most thoroughly built, and the one now under construction will be of greater capacity. Captain J. D. Biles superintends the work.—Standard.
