Maj. Magone introduced Mrs. and Mr. E. A. McCoy, who favored the audience during the evening with the most charming music. The President read Mrs. Duniway's letter published in the last New Northwest, after which R. Lockwood passed the constitution and by-laws around for the purpose of securing signers which resulted in the procuring of four new members. Major Magone then delivered a lengthy address on the subject of Franchisement, and was followed by Judge Olmsted, on the same question. The accomplished musicians then played a few soul-reviving pieces, after which Mr. Magone again arose and stated that in his opinion the people of this or any other city, ought to be doubly proud to know that they had in their midst such accomplished and excellent musicians, that he had never heard any persons that were prepared to entertain an audience in any city better than Mr. and Mrs. McCoy. The President then thanked them for the great favor shown the meeting and extended to them an invitation to call at any future meeting. 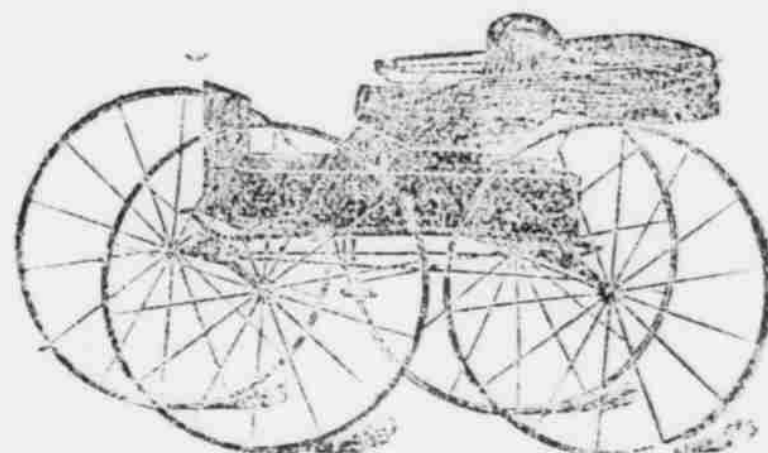

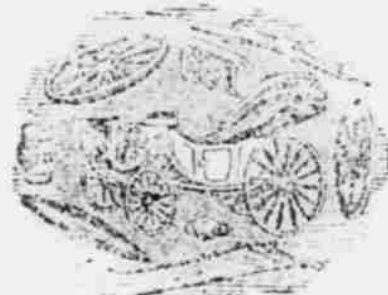
