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## THE RESERVATION.

Perhaps the most of our readers  
are aware ere this that the Malheur  
Reservation will, in all probability,  
be thrown open for settlement early  
next Spring, and the lands sold; the  
proceeds used for the future main-  
tenance of the Indians.

The above is what our citizens have  
prayed and hoped for for years past,  
as the Reservation contains good  
land enough, so we are told by Mr.  
Wm. Hall and other cattle men, to  
make, at least calculation, 100 good  
farms, besides plenty of grazing  
land for stock men. This will give  
Grant County a new start and ere  
many years she will be spoken of as  
the leading County of Eastern Ore-  
gon. It is now supposed two, if not  
three, railroads are to enter inside  
her lines; one through the Goose  
Lake Country, - the Winnemucca &  
Astoria road, - and one through the  
Harney Valley, and perhaps, the  
road that has been surveyed down  
Middle Fork may take a turn from  
Baker City and go this route. So  
our readers will see that the future  
is altogether bright for the County.

The Reservation has been a draw-  
back to Grant County and deterred  
hundreds from settling therein that  
would have made good homes here  
only they feared the Indians. Now,  
that that fear is dispelled the Mal-  
heur country, the Harney Valley,  
Long Creek and many other beauti-  
ful and fertile valleys in our favored  
County will rapidly settle up and  
where the Reservation brought \$1  
to our revenue the increase in popu-  
lation and wealth will bring more  
than an hundred fold to the business  
of the County. This County joins  
Humboldt Co., Nevada, and in that  
County they have the Trans Conti-  
nental Railroad and, of course if the  
other roads that are spoken of do go  
through it will be only a few years  
ere the valleys out South, that are  
now used by a very few men for graz-  
ing will be dotted over with farms as  
people like to be as near a railroad  
as possible and while they are sure  
of the excellent market on the Pa-  
cific Road at Winnemucca they will  
also be in close connection with the  
new road should it go through.

Just what will be done with the  
immense and endless quantity of  
supplies now at the Agency remains  
to be discovered. But in our opin-  
ion, as we have previously stated,  
some one is going to make a fortune  
out of them; of course it will not be  
a Western man, or men, but some  
Eastern Jobber. We only wish that  
the goods will be sold in lots so some  
of our people that have had the curse  
to contend with for years can get a  
show to make a few thousand out of  
the "Red Boys." However, the  
throwing open of the Reservation is  
glory enough for one day.

## THE STATE OF OREGON.

The Baker Democrat says \$200 was  
leaved up from an astray working

mine, near Peachoutas.

Coos County and sustained injuries  
which resulted in his death.

The trial of Dr. Covart for arson in
