THE MALHEUR RESERVATION TO BE SOLD.—The report of the Indian Bureau says with reference to Chief Winnemucca's Piutes now in Nevada, that it is not considered desirable to compel them to remove to the Malheur Reservation, and as most of the other Indians formerly collected there have been removed to Yakima, it is recommended that all lands included in the Malheur Reservation be appraised and sold, and the proceeds be invested for the benefit of the Indians. The lands comprise nearly 1,800,000 acres. Silver State.

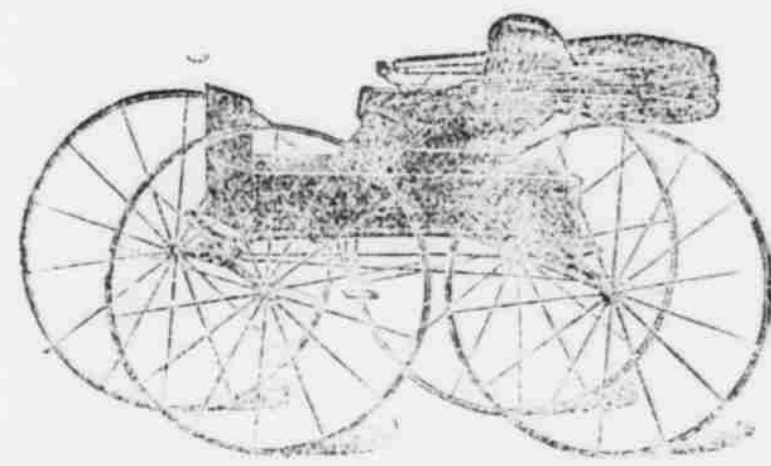

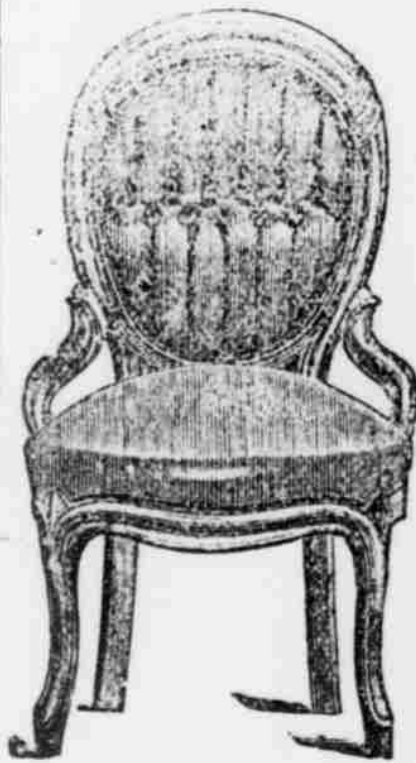

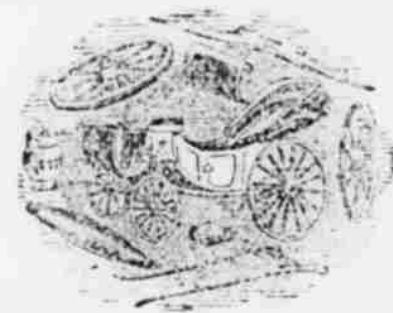
