LETTER FROM WOOD RIVER.

BELLEVUE, I. T., April 23d, 1882.
Wood River, a branch of the Snake, has an elevation of 5,000 ft. above the sea. The valley has an average width of about one mile. The slope is uniform and pleasing. The mountains rise hundreds of feet on both sides of the valley. The scenery is wild and rugged. Eternal snow rests upon the distant peaks. Winters are long and severe. The snow has just disappeared from the streets of the town—from one to six feet yet rests upon the mountains. Business is stagnant in winter, but active in summer. The people are similar in habits and idiosyncrasies to John Day, Canyon City, and Prairie City. The chief attractions of this region are

THE MINES,

which are extensive and promising. The ore is principally galena, ranging from 100 oz. to 650 oz. silver per ton. The ledges run North West, South East. Placer diggings are also found at various points of the river. The writer has been prospecting the past month, and considers himself fortunate in securing one ledge, the Jay Bird and also has a $\frac{1}{2}$ interest in the Maggie May lode. The principal towns are Bellevue, Hailey, Ketchum, Galena, Bullion, Sawtooth, Bradford and Muldoon. All are in the midst of rich silver fields. This is the largest town in the valley. It is well laid out and will be of considerable importance.

THE AGRICULTURAL INTERESTS

of this region are of minor importance. It is too high for general produce. Some of the hardier vegetables and fruits do fairly. The soil in the valley is of a sandy and gravelly nature. Grazing is excellent. Herds of cattle and sheep graze throughout this region during the summer months. In the fall all stock are driven to Snake river to winter. There is no grazing here of much consequence until the middle of May. Beef cattle here have been high and thin all winter and spring.

THE AMUSEMENTS

are various and exhilarating, consisting of miscellaneous dances, balls, gambling, theatres, parties, etc. Religious services every Sunday and Thursday. The Sunday-school has an attendance of about 100; it is the most interesting and instructive place on the river to the writer. The race park will be in readiness on the 1st of July, where all of riotous nature may find a congenial atmosphere. Everything destitute of horns is admitted to the curriculum. The Blue Mountain Belle would find a host of rivals in this region of sweepstakes. The Wood River people say, if the John Day Valley sports want their feathers cut and their pride in the dust, let them bring on their nag.
