A Finlander church has been organized at Greasewood, Umatilla county, the first of the kind in Eastern Oregon.

It is expected that a combination will be made by which Dakota, Montana and Washington will be admitted into the Union.

A cutter was detailed by the Government, which succeeded in forcing its way through great masses of ice to Kaasan bay, where the opium was found hid in Carroll's cannery.
