THE ELECTION.

Enough is known already to establish the fact that the prohibitory amendment is defeated in the State by from six to seven thousand majority. The other two amendments are also "snowed under," so that our Constitution remains the same. It is estimated that Grant county rolled up a handsome majority against them all, but the official count will not be had until today (Thursday), consequently it is only approximated.

Klamath county went heavily in favor of prohibition, also Linn county. The majority in the latter is approximated at 800 or 1,000. Multnomah county alone gave over 5,000 against the amendment.

HANGED.

Four of the condemned Anarchists Meet the Fate They so Richly Deserved.

On the 11th inst., four of the doomed men paid the penalty prescribed by the highest legal tribunal in the country, and yielded their lives to answer for the crimes committed against their government.

Spies, Parsons, Fischer and Engel were executed. Lingg committed suicide the day before by holding a fulminating cap in his mouth and firing it off. Schwab and Fielden had their sentence commuted by Gov. Oglesby.

An eight hour demonstration was made at Chicago May 1st, 1886, in which 40,000 workmen participated. This was followed by a general strike, every railroad was crippled and hundreds of manufactories closed. The anarchists paraded the streets with red flags, and indulged in violent incendiary threats. On May 4th they precipitated a riot, exploding a bomb among the police, killing a number, and wounding many more. The leaders were arrested, charged with inciting a riot, and with the murder of the police officers. The trial disclosed that although they did not throw the bomb, they caused it to be done, and Lingg, one of them was the maker of the bomb. It was premeditated murder, and the condemned were proven to be at least accessory before the fact, and at Chicago the 11th inst. was enacted the closing scene to this horrible drama.

The supreme court of the United States is at present a centre of popular interest on account of a number of important cases to be tried, among which are the prohibition cases from Kansas, Iowa and Georgia. The adjudication of these cases will determine the constitutionality of prohibitory legislation, and will involve millions of dollars besides, for in the event that the decision is adverse to such enactments, the states will be made pecuniarily responsible for backing up the liquor traffic without compensation to the dealers. Thus it can be readily perceived what a great responsibility rests on the judges of our highest court in deciding the cases above mentioned.

It will be remembered that congress appropriated \$147,000 last year as indemnity for property of Chinamen destroyed in the Rock Creek outrage. This sum was paid over to the Chinese government, which has recently informed our government that some of the original claims upon which the award was based have been found fraudulent, and that part of the money will be returned. Some so-called Christian nations, including our own, might learn a lesson in financial integrity from this incident.

The Northern Pacific is up and in arms and is holding the Snoqualmie Pass over the Cascade Mountains by armed men, against the forces of the Seattle, Lake Shore and Eastern road. Both companies are struggling for the pass, and after they have killed a few men, the difficulty will be decided by the Courts, where it should be settled before bad blood is spilled.

Fifteen years ago Jacob Trackbach, of New Portage, Ohio, who was thought to be rich and was known to be miserly, died; but all efforts to find the money that he was supposed to have accumulated failed. The other day two woodchoppers cut down a tree near the miser's old home, and in a hole in the tree found gold, silver and notes to the value of \$14,000. They tried to keep it quiet, but their good fortune was too much for them. They had found Trackbach's money.

President Cleveland has issued a proclamation publishing the amended reciprocity treaty between the United States and Hawaii, agreed upon by the plenipotentiaries of the two governments December 6th, 1884, and since ratified by both nations. The amended convention provides its definite duration seven years from the date of the exchange of the ratifications and further, until twelve months after either party shall have given notice of a wish to terminate it. It grants the United States the exclusive right of vessels to enter the harbor of Pearl river in the Island of Oahu and establish and maintain a coaling station.
