

Germany is going for the socialists, and many of them have been sent to prison for long terms lately. The press is muzzled, and has nothing to say in regard to the cases.

The president has approved the act of congress providing that pensions heretofore or hereafter granted to widows of soldiers of the rebellion shall commence at the date of the death of their husbands.

A plan for building a bridge between Dover, England, and Calais, France, to cost \$150,000,000 and to be finished in six years, with a railway and roadway over it, is attracting attention and comment.

The presidential campaign has been started, and ere long will be well under way. The News will take no part in the fun, but as usual will occupy a strictly independent position so far as any political party is concerned.

The Anthropological Congress in New York admits that America was first discovered by Chinese, who named it Fu Sang. Good name, too. We wish that few sang still, for more do it than know how, and life is made miserable.

A bill has been introduced in Congress giving to fourth-class postmasters five dollars for each quarter, in addition to their present compensation. With this princely salary of \$20 per annum, nearly every man will yearn to become a postmaster.

The Chicago Republican National Convention has had plenty of trouble in nominating a man. Nothing is known later than the 23d, except what news the stage driver brought in from Baker Tuesday evening, which was to the effect that Harrison of Indiana, had secured the nomination for President, or was so far ahead that he was almost sure of receiving it.

There is some talk at government headquarters of having all the land office business that is now done at the offices of the clerks done at the land offices themselves. Should such an order be made the proving up on land in this country would have to be made at The Dalles and La Grande land offices in stead of at the clerk's office in this city. But as to that nothing definite is known as yet, and for the financial welfare and convenience of the settlers in Grant county we hope it may not become a law—at least until we get our own land office in this new district.

In 1868, when Seymour and Grant were running for President, there was a gathering of the Second Adventists, in July, at Milwaukee. These people it will be remembered, believed the world was coming to an end in September. One morning one of the clergymen found a democrat from Kentucky and a republican discussing the coming election. He said: "Gentlemen, there is no use discussing this question, for before that time the Lord will reign triumphant throughout the world." The democrat replied: "I will bet you twenty-five dollars he can't carry Kentucky." —Ex.

Senator Dolph's bill providing for the payment of Oregon and Washington Indian war claims, and his bill for the payment of the claim of the state of Oregon growing out of the war of the rebellion and Indian wars have been referred by the committee on military affairs to Senator Stewart, who has promised, as soon as he returns from the Chicago convention, that he will secure an early report. A Washington dispatch to the Oregonian says: "Senator Dolph, in the senate, upon the passage of the bill reported from the committee on Indian affairs to pay for cattle belonging to a contractor killed by Indians on a reservation, called the attention of the senate to Indian depredation claims, and said it was a great outrage that claimants whose claims had been presented more than a quarter of a century ago to the government, with proper proofs, were unable to secure necessary legislation by congress for payment of their claims.
