The annexation of Cuba is likely to be a live issue in this country before long. The Spanish grip is weakening, and Cuba must be independent or a part of the United States.

The bill to relieve certain parties who paid \$2,500 an acre for government land that had been reduced in price to \$1,25 by act of congress, which concerns a number of settlers in Oregon, has passed the Senate.

Dr. Powell, Labor candidate for Governor of Wisconsin, is the grandson of a full-blooded Seneca Indian. He is well known amongst the Indians, who call him "White Beaver," and he wants to be Governor of the Badger State.

The amount of "Oregon war claims" against the general government is nearly \$400,000. Mr. Dolph is reported as saying that no adverse report has been made by the committee, as has been stated; and he claims to believe that the bill will pass.

The Supreme court of Washington territory has again decided the Woman Suffrage law unconstitutional. After one or two more such decisions the damns will ease their howling and give attention to their housework. This is the second time this law has been passed, and the second time it has been declared unconstitutional.

The House Committee on Public Lands has referred to a sub-committee the Senate bill declaring forfeiture of lands granted to aid in the construction of wagon roads in Oregon with instructions to consider it in connection with the House bill which provides for a more sweeping forfeiture in accordance with recommendations of the Interior Department.

The new political party styled the "American Party," held its national convention at New York on August 16. The platform is mainly against foreign immigration, and a change in the naturalization laws, making a longer residence necessary to citizenships. "America for Americans" is their motto. The National Convention of the "American party" broke up in a row, but a portion of the delegates, nominated James L. Curtis of New York, for President, and James N. Greer for Vice-President. It is astonishing how many people like to make cranks of themselves.

## POLITICAL DRIFT.

The Mills bill, for the purpose of reducing the surplus, made wool free and left the duty on sugar. The tariff on wool represents an income of \$6,000,000 and that on sugar an income of \$57,000,000 Boise Statesman.

The Chicago Tribune says: "So long as American manufacturers are burdened with taxes on raw material, which is obtained free by foreign producers, they cannot compete in neutral markets." That is common sense, but it is not Republican doctrine. Alta.

It is estimated that the amount paid by the State of Oregon annually to the Government and to Eastern manufacturers on account of the present high tariff is about six million dollars, or five-hundred thousand per month. This gives some explanation why farmers with fine soil, climate and luxuriant crops that never fail, make but little from their farms. In other words, wealth cannot be created by taxation, except for the favored few. — East Oregonian.

To reduce the tariff is to enormously increase importations. All increase of importation will accordingly decrease the sale of American made goods, will reduce the demand for the services of the laborer in our country, and as wages are largely controlled by the demand and supply of laborers, an increase in the number of wage-earners follows, and as the number of wage-earners increase, wages decrease. These are the logical results of the free trade tendencies of the Democratic party. — La Grande Gazette.

It is insolence for any person to demand "protection" as a right. It is not "protection" he demands. It is charity. Protection he already has. No man dare steal his money, or beat out his brains without suffering the penalty of the law. He stands on an equality with all men. But when he asks that people be compelled to pay more for his goods than they could otherwise obtain them, solely for the purpose of assisting him in business he asks more than protection. He asks for special privileges, which enroach to a certain extent upon the rights of others. It is sheer insolence for any man to establish himself in an unprofitable business and then demand that government protect him by taxing the people to make his business profitable. Yet such is the "protection" of high tariff taxation. — La Grande Journal.
