Silver is rapidly advancing in price, having gone up over five per cent in the London market during the past two weeks. If this should continue it will not be long until the bullion in our silver dollars are worth more than a gold dollar.

A great many babies all over the country have been wearing men's hats for some time. In them they look real cute, many of them adding much to their appearance by the new departure.

When the navigation on the Missouri closes this winter, the probabilities are that it will close forever. Had anyone predicted thirty years ago when 125 majestic steamboats were engaged in traffic between St. Louis and Kansas City, that all boats would be withdrawn in the fall of 1888, he would have been looked upon as insane.

One of the "sins of omission" chargeable to the congress which closed its session at Washington lately was the failure to provide for the admission of Dakota into the Union. An attempt was made in that direction in the Senate, but it failed on account of partisan opposition in the House.

The sporting fraternity in the East have had on both Ohio and Illinois going democratic. The probability is, however, that Ohio will give about 8,000 republican majority. In Illinois there is some chance of electing a democratic governor and a possibility of the Cleveland electors carrying the state.

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The establishment of a state mining bureau is being agitated. As such bureaus already exist in different states, it is argued that they are of far more importance in the way of doing practical work in developing the resources of the state and making its topography known to intending settlers than immigration societies. Such bureaus are not alone of value to the mining districts by bringing the mineral resources before the public, but the agricultural districts as well would reap the benefits.

According to a dispatch to the New York World, Queen Victoria is indeed a housekeeper. The position is an attractive one from a financial point of view. Mrs. Henderson, in the Windsor Castle housekeeper, is dead. The occupant of the position not only has an adequate salary, but excellent apartments in the castle, valuable privileges, and numerous privileges.
