Contrary to the expectations of one-half of those who put up money in the stakeholder's hands the U. S. went republican and Harrison and Morton were elected president and vice-president to wield the scepter of power for the next four years from March 4th, 1889.

New York went republican. The unofficial vote of all the counties in the state show a plurality for Cleveland of 78,956 and for Harrison of 90,147 giving Harrison a plurality in the state of 11,191.

The democratic state committee concede a republican majority of 1500 in Indiana. They claim nine out of the thirteen congressmen and a majority of ten in the legislature on joint ballot.

Connecticut went democratic by 494 majority. Prohibition Fisk got 3879 votes in the state. In Vermont the democrats give Cleveland 30,000 majority and elect all the congressmen.

The republicans of Massachusetts got 1881 votes in 1888, and elect all the congressmen.

Illinois was carried by the republicans by about 10,000. Returns from every county in Pennsylvania show a plurality for Harrison of 72,000. Our republican majority is again reduced.

In New Jersey Cleveland has a plurality of about 7,000, both branches legislative being elected first time in ten years.

Both parties claim California. The official vote will decide.

Harrison and Morton carry every northern state except New Jersey and Connecticut. They have a majority of 65 in the electoral college.

Oregon's republican majority this election is estimated at 8,000. The next House of Representatives at Washington will also be largely republican.

Oregon needs a reform school for boys and girls. Numbers of mere children are brought before the courts throughout the state for greater or less crimes, and some of them are convicted and sent to the penitentiary to serve out their sentences in the society of hardened criminals, and instead of their punishment being a means of reform at the end of their sentence they are much worse morally, and their minds are so polluted with the associations of a prison pen that it seems almost impossible for the good principles of their natures to thrive.

Coupled with the stain on their character the evil propensities grow, and the prison or the gallows is their ultimate end. Southern Oregon sent a sixteen-year old boy to the penitentiary recently for murder, and had the state had a reform school that boy might have been educated and trained to a life of usefulness instead of the lessons in crime he will learn from his associates with older criminals. A thirteen-year old boy, Gid Raines, is before the circuit court of this county charged with larceny. Should he be convicted the penitentiary at Salem will be his stopping place, whereas, if we had a reform school in Oregon the boy would be given an opportunity of becoming an honest man. There is work for the next legislature.
