The Georgia legislature has just appropriated an extra \$500,000 for the public schools.

A Canadian school teacher was fined \$2 for whipping a pupil, whereupon the children of the neighborhood took up a collection and paid the amount.

Lively times in West Virginia! In one county there are seven hundred Federal indictments for illegal voting. It is time to change the name of that state or the manners of some of its people.

That Providence girl who married one of the Chinese pupils in her Sunday school has been expelled from the school and the church. This will increase the difficulty she will have in converting her husband to Christianity.

An effort is on foot to get the legislature at the coming session to raise the pay of members. A member of the legislature should receive pay sufficient at least to cover his expenses at the state capital. Oregon should be able to pay members at least six dollars per day for sixty days session. The present limit is altogether to short.

The fact that a frog depends more on his legs than his brains has been successfully demonstrated by a St. Louis doctor, who recently removed the brains from a dozen frogs, healed the wounds and let them go. They hopped off as usual and proved they had lost nothing of value. If some physician should try a like experiment upon a dude a similar result might be reached.

Do things travel in a circle and not in a straight line? England led the world in attacking the slave trade and abolishing slavery, and now an English company is reported as declaring that colonization is impossible in Africa without using slave labor! California has affected the politics of the whole country by outwitting against Chinese labor, and now Californians are boldly declaring that the state can't do without Chinese. Does mankind know what it wants, anyway?—Alta.

The action of the Democratic House caucus in declaring in favor of the admission of the territories seemed to promise some definite results at the present session. The House Committee on Territories, however, has postponed the consideration of the territorial question until January 15. It is proposed to bring up on that day a bill for the admission of South Dakota, and to substitute therefor the omnibus bill agreed upon by the caucus. The postponement is said to be for the purpose of allowing members to frame amendments to the bill, so that no delay may take place when once the bill is before the House. Many of the advocates of admission fear that this delay will be fatal to the prospects of admission by the present congress, owing to the shortness of the session and the inevitable pressure of business in its closing days.

According to a recent dispatch, the Chinese laborers are leaving California at a rapid rate. Since the passage of the Scott bill, 2,943 Chinese have left the country for China and not over 75 have landed. The dispatch says further that "On the Pacific coast to-day there are not over 65,000 Chinese all told, and not over 90,000 in the whole country. More than two-thirds of those are laborers, while the balance are women, children, merchants and students. There is no reason for any uneasiness regarding laborers for the Pacific coast in the future, even though every laboring Chinaman should leave. The presence of Chinese labor has retarded the immigration of honest white labor to this coast from the overcrowded East, where wages are lower in many places than are even paid Chinese. Now that they are rapidly leaving this coast, some encouragement will be given to white labor to come in and supply the demand.

The Spanish government at Porto Rico, fined an American vessel \$4000 in July, 1887, for having a less cargo on board than was shown by the manifest. No reasonable excuse being given, the fine was never remitted, and the department of state insists that the Spanish officers acted only in accordance with their laws, and drops the matter.

The Immigration Investigation Committee has discovered that paupers and insane persons are run across the line from Canada into the United States in defiance of the law. That has been an open secret for years. Officers of hospitals and almshouses have long known where many of their charges come from. If the investigation is extended far enough, something may also be found out regarding smuggling Chinese over the border.

A Massachusetts man who has mysteriously disappeared left a letter stating he was about to commit suicide. "My plan," he wrote, "is to fasten a lot of dynamite around my body and take a little boat, row out far enough, and then touch the fuse so that my body will be torn to pieces and scattered by the water." The plan is certainly effective, and the anarchist professors who are teaching the use of dynamite should not fail to impress upon the minds of their pupils its value as an agent for suicide.
