Senator Stewart of Nevada has come forward with a proposition for California to cede to Nevada that portion of the state east of the summit of the Sierra Nevada mountains which he says congress originally proposed should constitute a part of Nevada's boundaries. He says the streams from the east side of the Sierra Nevada pass through a portion of California into Nevada, and unless the question of jurisdiction of water supply and irrigation, which are becoming very embarrassing, can be settled, many things are likely to go wrong and vast tracts of land now available for agriculture by irrigation will remain deserts.
