One of the New York doctors reports a case of deafness by a kiss on the ear. Most people are dumb after a kiss; but deafness is a new symptom. There should be a kissing school opened. There is no reason why a fellow should rupture a young lady's ear drum, or explode himself in such a manner as to prevent her hearing his protestations of affection. A narrow escape was recently had in the case of a bill for the relief of Motier Howe of Caledonia, in this county. It involved the title to his home. The bill was introduced by Representative Hermann, and passed the house and senate, and was sent to the president for his approval. It was submitted to the secretary of the interior for examination. The commissioner of the general land office, within a week past, had received notice from some attorney in Oregon, endeavoring to thwart the settler's success, and the commissioner, on this simple showing, reported in favor of a veto, and just as the bill was being transmitted to the president for his formal veto message. Mr. Hermann had timely warning and at once proceeded to consult the secretary of the interior, where he represented the equities of the case, and the great hardship upon Mr. Howe, who had resided fourteen years upon the land, and paid \$1000 to the administrator for the deed which was invalid because of the defect of title from the government; and upon this showing, Secretary Vilas at once countermanded the previous order, and the president signed and approved the bill.

The United States senate has been engaged for some time on the tariff bill. The duties on all kinds of wool on the schedule have been materially advanced.

The Minnesota Legislature has been trying to elect a United States senator, but one member confesses that he was promised an office for his vote, another he got money, and a third that he got drunk in the caucus and did not know what he was doing.
