The official report shows that two thousand five hundred men deserted from the army during the past year, involving a loss to the government of more than \$625,000.

A Scheme is on foot in the Canadian parliament to subsidize a fast steamship line to China and Japan. The animus of the whole thing is shown in the fact that the government will pay no subsidies to vessels toneling at ports in the United States.

Considerable ill-feeling is being nursed in Canada over the United States with respect to the Behring Sea fisheries. The discussions in parliament showed a dislike to the United States, and there is shown a persistence in insisting that England should make her power felt in Behring sea.

A man has just been sentenced for life to the state's prison of Michigan for the murder of his mother. Lives of Michigan mothers must be held at a great discount, or the commission of the crime must have had "extenuating circumstances," even this inhuman fiend would have been hanged or burned at the stake.

Lo Burgolo is King of Matabeleland, Africa. He is Lo by name, but high by nature. He went hunting recently and had bad luck. But it was his day to bag game, so he evened up by killing 150 of his attendants. He probably did this to avoid being joked about his bad luck. The canal connecting the waters of the Atlantic and Pacific oceans should be built by American capital and subject to American control. In time of peace it should be open on equal terms to vessels of all nations, and in time of war closed to the enemies of the United States. Oliver Perry, aged 21, drowned himself in the Central park reservoir, N. Y. He was dressed in a clawhammer coat, white tie and other habiliments of full dress. It is supposed he could not support his mother as he wished on his salary, and hence killed himself, but what will become of mother now, since the fool son is no more?

Father Damien, who sacrificed all the pleasures of society to impart religious instruction to the lepers of Molokai Island, one of the Sandwich group, died with the loathsome disease April 14. He had been afflicted with leprosy for over two years, and suffered patiently for his religious faith. When rendered helpless to perform his duties he asked for help, and Father Conrardy, then stationed on the Unatilla reservation, went to the leper island to his aid. E. O.

The wave of enthusiasm on which for a while the prohibition craze rode triumphant, seems to be subsiding, and it looks like a dead calm was about to succeed the storm of excitement which at one time threatened to carry everything before it. The decisive majority by which the prohibition amendment was recently defeated in New Hampshire, was followed by a similar result in Massachusetts. Pennsylvania will vote on a proposition to engraft prohibition upon the state constitution in June, and the prediction comes from sources undoubtedly reliable, because conservative, that Pennsylvania will also reject the amendment by an overwhelming majority. Rhode Island after a year's experience is disgusted with the prohibition amendment to the constitution, and returns to high license and local option. In other states there are evidences that the cold water people are losing ground, so that it now looks like the region of prohibition would be confined to states where it was engrafted upon the constitution before the furor of the reformers began to lose potency.

AN OPEN QUESTION.

Is Harrison a Descendant of Pocahontas?

It is popularly believed that President Harrison is descended from Pocahontas and from the Parliamentary soldier and regicide General Thomas Harrison who was executed in 1660. Pocahontas, daughter of Powhatan, married a French trader for the early white settlers of Virginia when she was but a girl. The story of how she saved the life of Captain John Smith, who had been captured and condemned to death by her father—how she on several occasions, made known to the settlers their danger when about to be attacked—is well known to all acquainted with the early history of America. Her subsequent marriage with John Rolfe, an Englishman—her removal to England where a son was born, from whom numerous wealthy families of Virginia claim descent—is the basis of the opinion that President Harrison is one of her descendants.

Whether this be true or not it is, however, well known that President Harrison is a descendant of a noted family, distinguished alike in peace and war. The name of Harrison is already indelibly written upon the pages of American history, for General Wm. Henry Harrison—the ninth President of the United States—was the grandfather of Gen. Ben. Harrison. 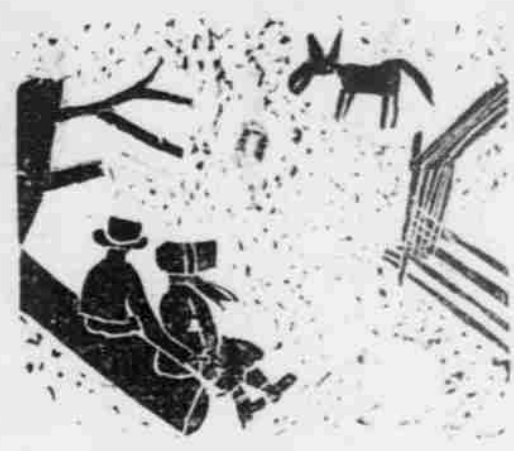
