The state debt of Louisiana amounts to \$12,000,000, and the lottery company that commonwealth offers to liquidate it in full if the authorities will extend their license for a period of fifty years. The offer made is now under advisement, and may be accepted.

Positively the oldest Mason in the world has been discovered. He is Robert I. Chester, of Tennessee, one of the Cleveland electors in 1884. He was born in Tennessee in July, 1793, and will complete his ninety-sixth year this month. He joined the Masonic order in Tennessee in 1814, when he was twenty-one years of age.

It is alleged that a larger percentage of sheep herders become insane than those of any other vocation. This is accounted for by the solitude of their lives. There is nothing more depressing to mental vigor than absolute quiet. Business men, who don't advertise, are in danger of losing their mental balance, if, indeed, they have not already lost it.

A law prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to minors in New York, went into effect the first of June. 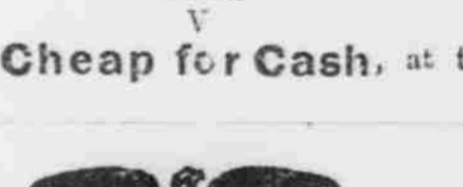
