About ten months elapses till we are called upon to choose state officers, and already some journals of the state are stating their preferences for men for various positions.

This act prohibits, under penalty of fine and imprisonment, the seizure of vessels, and the carrying of seals, found engaged in violating the act, the killing of fur-bearing animals within the limits of Alaska Territory, or the waters thereof. The seizure has caused much indignation in Canada. The dispatches already received are under consideration by the Dominion authorities, and the seizure will, of course, be the subject of discussion at Washington. Probably no definite action in reference to the matter will be taken by the Canadian authorities until an official report is received. From Canadian advices it appears that no word has been received from England in relation to the matter, and of course Canada's action must be determined by the attitude of the imperial government.
