The lesson comes high, but the more progressive cities on this coast are rapidly learning that it pays to equip and maintain a thoroughly organized fire department and enable them to combat small fires before they develop into conflagrations.

The Fossil Journal says the following and it is about correct: The gentleman who edits the crop weather bulletin in the office of the Oregon State weather bureau is quite ingenuous, but his subjects are rather dry, and the reports are necessary very monotonous. After reading a series of them we feel like digging up a few volumes of patent office reports in the rubbish back of our office and perusing them just to get something refreshing and lively. The main fault we find with some of his reports is that they are not true. In his report of August 17, 1889, he leaves crops and weather and turns on water. On this subject he says: "Water is very scarce in Eastern Oregon. All springs and most of the creeks are dry." Water may be scarce, but the statement that all springs had gone dry is false. There are tens of thousands of fine springs in Eastern Oregon that are running the same to day that they have for time immemorial, and not one in 500 has gone dry. You'd better put in your time on crops and weather and in drawing your salary and let the springs of Eastern Oregon alone, or else guess again.

If the State weather bureau persists in lying about the larger portion of the State, or states such palpable falsehoods unintentionally to the detriment thereof, it had better be abolished. In this instance it is guilty of gross carelessness to say the least.

An Ottawa editor longs fiercely to see the Dominion give the United States a complete whipping. He does not seem to have any connected or coherent ideas about what the United States will be doing while this process is going on.—Oregonian.

The Nevada papers give doleful accounts of cattle perishing for want of water in that state, one statement is to the effect that from Humboldt House west, the water holes in the river bed is said to be lined with dead carcasses. On the little Humboldt similar stories are told.
